Namibia's mortuaries at capacity amid Covid surge

amibia's President Hage Geingob has said his country is facing a "dark and sombre moment" as coronavirus deaths and cases rapidly increase.

The southern African nation is currently experiencing the worst daily death rate on the continent.

The health system is stretched and the country's mortuaries "have reached maximum capacity", Health Minister Kalumbi Shangula said. The president announced new restrictions to stem the rise in cases.

These include extending a night-time curfew and stopping movement between the country's regions.

Addressing the nation, Mr Geingob said that 513 Namibians had died from the virus in the last 15 days.

This is a huge blow for a country of just 2.5 million.

On average, 15 people per million are dying every day in Namibia, a higher number than Seychelles (13 per million) and Tunisia (7.5 per million), and among the worst the health minister, who was rates in the world, according to the Our World in Data website.

South Africa, which has the continent's highest number of total deaths from coronavirus just over 60,000 - has a daily death rate of three per million.

Everyone in Namibia has either buried a close relative who has died from Covid or knows someone who has, said

"Our country is literally in an existential struggle against this pandemic. We are in a fight for our very lives," Dr Shangula added. Coronavirus cases have trebled since the beginning of June and the situation is likely to continue to get worse until mid-August at the earliest, the president

Less than 5% of Namibians have received at least one dose of a coronavirus vaccine.

Depoliticizing the COVID-19 fight

RECENT OFFER BY the leader of the opposition Alternative National Congress Alexander B. Cummings to help the Government of Liberia in the current fight against the coronvirus, and subsequent acceptance by President George Manneh Weah is a welcome signal that should unite Liberians around a national cause void of politics.

MR. CUMMINGS IN a recent statement offered to work with the government in whatever reasonable way in tackling the resurgence, which experts say is the Delta variant.

HE SAID THE Cummings Africa Foundation is open to working with authorities of the Ministry of Health to identify urgent gaps in the national response to yield quick interventions. The ANC leader revealed that he has sent out SOS call to the international community, especially the United States, the European Union, and all friendly nations of the world, for much-needed help with vaccines, medical supplies, ventilators, and other support for hospitals and community clinics across the country.

IN NO TIME, President Weah accepted the offer from the opposition politician, indicating that he is willing to listen to and work with Mr. Cummings, void of political hindrance, adding "The coronavirus is no joke...Liberians are losing their lives every day to the plague. President Weah said if the help being offered by Cummings is without a political trace, it would go a long way in beefing up the health sector and finding a remedy to the unanticipated health crisis.

WE WELCOME THIS spirit of collaboration, particularly in times of national crisis such as the current health pandemic that has taken the lives of hundreds, if not thousands of Liberians, and millions around the world.

WE CHALLENGE OTHER opposition political leaders in the country to emulate the ANC leader's example, and the corresponding reception from the President in joining hands to kick coronvirus out of Liberia.

IT IS IN such critical period when the nation needs all of its best to stand up for a united cause. The gesture by both Weah and Cummings clearly demonstrate leadership that transcends selfish interest and blinded self-ego.

The Virus Next Time

RISBANE - As more developed countries begin to feel as though of the COVID-19 crisis, two striking realities are coming into view. First, one can clearly see just how vulnerable many developing countries still are to rapidly escalating outbreaks of the type we are witnessing in India. The results of failing to distribute the most effective vaccines equitably and strategically are being laid bare.

Second, with more dangerous and contagious variants continuing to emerge, we do not have the luxury of delaying work toward a new international system for pandemic preparedness and response. We must start that project waiting for progress on all of these fronts. immediately. And fortunately, the Independent Panel for Pandemic Preparedness and Response (IPPR), chaired by former New Zealand Prime Minister Helen Clark and former Liberian President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf, has just published a blueprint for how to do it.

The question now is whether governments are ready not just to listen but to act. The answer will determine whether we can prevent future epidemics from becoming global catastrophes. I know from my own government's experience during the 2009 swine flu (H1N1) pandemic that it is crucial to confront these crises with immediate, far-reaching, and coordinated action. Thanks to eight months of work by the IPPR, policymakers now have a comprehensive set of recommendations for transforming how we manage pandemic risks.

Chief among the panel's proposals is a call for pandemic preparedness and response to be elevated to the highest level of political leadership through a new Global Health Threats Council, which should be health crises. Either through direct contributions or a kind of assessed both ongoing preparedness and rapidresponse measures in low- and middleincome countries.

The IPPR has offered the kind of emphatic, dispassionate, and actionable guidance that governments need and - in this case - have demanded through the World Health Organization. Four years ago, the Independent Commission on Multilateralism (ICM, which I chaired) tried to raise the alarm about the growing threat of pandemics in its report Global

Pandemics and Global Public Health. > In addition to issuing a clear warning, the commission's report made a series of bold recommendations to strengthen the multilateral system in the face of potential global health crises. Its proposals for clearer rules for verification and earlywarning mechanisms have now been echoed in the IPPR's recommendations, as has its call for a more empowered independent WHO secretariat. We are still

> We cannot afford to let the IPPR's report fall on the same deaf ears. And yet, that is exactly what seems to be happening. The 74th World Health Assembly just voted to spend six months studying the panel's report before even considering taking any action. Such delays are simply unacceptable.

> The COVID-19 crisis has borne out an uncomfortable truth that is emphasized in the IPPR's report: namely, that many of the national and global institutions established to deal with global pandemics are not fit for purpose, or have not been properly activated. From the moment in late 2019 and early 2020 when the existing International Health Regulations failed, the COVID-19 outbreak became a global catastrophe. And since then, our national and global economic responses have been too slow, tepid, and uncoordinated - a failure that the post-2008 G20 architecture was supposed to prevent.

The current crisis could still become much worse before it gets any better. We are based at the United Nations headquarters already witnessing a breakdown of global in New York. The panel has also proposed supply chains, which will lead to terrible an International Financing Facility for economic, political, and public-health Pandemic Preparedness and Response to outcomes. We need to get back on track help share the burden in future global now so that we can fight not only future pandemics but also this one.

The G7 summit in Cornwall on June 11-13 is an opportunity to concentrate our efforts with backing from the highest political levels. COVID-19 has been costly for all of us. The ICM's 2017 report anticipated that we would be here one day and identified the solutions we would need to implement. Let us use the IPPR's findings to enact meaningful reforms and show real leadership, so that this pandemic will be the last one to catch us off guard.

India Looks West

EW DELHI - Recent conciliatory moves by India's nationalist government on its western flank have rightly aroused global interest. But Prime Minister Narendra Modi's calculus appears relatively simple. Faced with continued Chinese aggression on India's northern appears relatively simple. Faced with continued Chinese aggression on India's northern frontier and a likely Taliban resurgence in Afghanistan, improving relations on the country's western flank, with Pakistan, seems prudent.

In recent weeks, there have been reports of secret back-channel talks between Indian and Pakistani security officials - facilitated by the United Arab Emirates - aimed at easing bilateral tensions. A February 2021 ceasefire along the Line of Control separating Indian and Pakistani forces in the disputed Kashmir region has so far held, permitting an atmosphere of nearnormalcy in the area.

India has also been talking to the Taliban, which it long derided as surrogates for the Pakistani army, reflecting the increasing likelihood that the mullahs will reclaim power in Kabul following the withdrawal of US forces from Afghanistan in September. Furthermore, India has kept two of its consulates in Afghanistan closed since last year, a long-standing Pakistani demand that it had resisted for two decades.

And in late June, Modi's government held surprisingly amicable talks in New Delhi with 14 mainstream Kashmiri political leaders. Almost all of them had been arrested during the government's crackdown in the state of Jammu and Kashmir that began in August 2019, and had been demonized by the ruling Bharatiya Janata Party since then.

All of this points to a policy shift by a government conscious of the pressures on India's northern frontier. Chinese troops have failed to disengage since the spring of 2020, when they advanced across disputed territory in the Ladakh region and later provoked a military encounter that took the lives of 20 Indian soldiers. With China doggedly refusing to withdraw, despite 11 rounds of talks, India's insistence on restoring the status quo ante looks increasingly forlorn.

Hostility with China is likely to endure, in which case India cannot afford escalating tensions to its west. Indian-Pakistani relations are at their lowest level in recent times, owing to a series of incidents, beginning with the terrorist attack on Mumbai in November 2008 and culminating in the 2019 Indian air strike on Balakot in Pakistan. And the Indian government outraged Pakistan with its August 2019 decision to strip Jammu and Kashmir of its constitutionally guaranteed autonomy and reduce its status to a "union territory," directly administered from Delhi. The Pakistani government subsequently mounted a worldwide campaign, working especially with Islamic countries but also at the United Nations, to censure India and force it to rescind the move.

Modi had remained implacable until recently, so the three-and-a-half-hour meeting with Kashmiri leaders was a surprise development. The leaders, who included four former chief ministers of Jammu and Kashmir, spanned the spectrum of the region's main political parties. The Modi government had previously denounced some of them as corrupt dynasts, accusing them of milking the state for their own benefit. But now they were welcomed with sweet words and deferential protocol by Modi, Home Minister Amit Shah (India's second most powerful politician), and other senior officials.

The government's crackdown in Jammu and Kashmir has not achieved any of its proclaimed objectives - namely, to inaugurate a new era of peace and development, eliminate terrorism, break the political grip of a few families, and hasten the region's integration with the rest of the country. But it would be wrong to see the government's recent talks with the Kashmiri leaders as an admission of defeat.

The discussions focused on three issues. One was an agreement to carry out, with the Kashmiri parties' cooperation, a new demarcation of the state's political constituencies, which will likely enhance the Jammu region's representation in the state assembly. The other agenda items were elections across Jammu and Kashmir, and restoration of its statehood.

Rather than a defeat for the Indian government, therefore, the talks seem to have shifted the goalposts. The earth-shattering news in August 2019 was the abolition of Article 370 of India's constitution, which guaranteed Jammu and Kashmir's special autonomous status. But that matter was not even discussed, because it was deemed to be sub judice (petitions on the matter are pending before the Supreme Court). Instead, the main issue was restoration of statehood, which the government had in any case promised "at an appropriate time."

This could lead to a politically viable trade-off, whereby the central government gives Jammu and Kashmir statehood if state leaders agree to go quiet on Article 370 and leave the matter to the judiciary. If that happens, as seems likely, Kashmiris will have the illusion of wresting a concession while the Modi government's real victory - the revocation of autonomy two years ago - goes unchallenged by the Kashmiri parties.

Meanwhile, Pakistan's global campaign against India to restore the state's autonomy has gone nowhere. Pakistan's leaders have their own reasons for wanting to resume dialogue with India, but they needed to see some movement from Modi's government to justify it. Talks with Kashmiri leaders leading to something like the restoration of statehood may constitute enough progress to warrant further discussions. The Indian government will thus chalk up another win if it enters new bilateral talks without making any real concession on the preconditions that Pakistan has been loudly declaiming for two years.

These recent developments are early moves in a slowly unfolding regional chess game. The situation in Afghanistan, the implications of China's close economic ties with Pakistan through the Belt and Road Initiative, and the evolution of the insurgencies led by both the Afghan Taliban and its Pakistani equivalent, have yet to play themselves out. Simmering Kashmiri militancy could boil over, while Pakistan - if it is unable or unwilling to stem terror attacks from its territory on Indian targets - could again prove duplicitous in its peace overtures.

There are too many unknowns for any side to have victory in sight. But for now, at least, India appears to be making the right moves.





Liberia: Over 350,000 persons to obtain COVID-19 Vaccination

ver 350,000 persons are expected to obtain covid-19 vaccination as the World Bank approved additional financing to the Liberia COVID-19 Emergency Preparedness and Response Project.

The gesture is to enable affordable and equitable access to COVID-19 vaccines

The financing, in the total amount of \$8 million grant (\$7 million International Development Association-IDA and \$1 million Health Emergency Preparedness and Response Multi-Donor Trust), will support the purchase of vaccines and their deployment, reaching approximately 386,000 people. The resources will also help strengthen systems of vaccination programs more broadly and support other COVID-19 response activities.

"In the wake of a third



Covid-19 wave that is more devastating than the first two, we believe that ramping up the vaccination program in Liberia, as in other countries, will be a game changer," said Dr. Khwima Nthara, World Bank Country Manager in Liberia. "Hope people will take full advantage

of this opportunity and get vaccinated to protect themselves and their loved ones," He added.

Under the original project that was approved on April 9, 2020, the World Bank has supported Liberia purchase 10 ambulances, 20 ventilators,

he Maryland county health team in southeast Liberia has reported 10 new confirmed cases of the Coronavirus, days after it released two of the three patients that were recently tested positive of the virus.

County Health Officer Dr. Metheodius George, said increment in cases of the virus in county is quite

The County Health Officer lauded the county health team for the role played in tracking the recent COVID-19 cases after patients showed signs and symptoms especially, respiratory symptom.

Dr. George noted that most of the recent cases are people who were brought to the emergency unit after they interacted with family members and community dwellers.

"I am worried, though the County has a rapid diagnosis test

various communities but because everyone hasn't been tested yet so you can't tell as to who are the carriers. Those that we interact with or those that have been tested of the virus came from communities, so we that are living within those communities and have interacted with those people on a daily basis need to be more careful or come to the health facilities for test", he cautioned.

He advised residents to report anyone showing signs and symptoms of respiratory distress or any other symptom to immediately visit health facilities in the county.

Speaking of the discharge of two patients, including the recent one on June 29, Dr. George said it has so far reduced fear among the local population following resurgence of the virus.

He said based on past experience with Ebola, coupled with professional skills, they were able to successfully apply requisite medication which eventually saw the two patients reunited with their families.

"We are proud of our people and partners who have been showing care by getting themselves and their loved ones vaccinated because of this trend, Maryland County Health Team is on top and we are hoping that we will achieve more", he added.



2021 human trafficking report downgrades Liberia

By Jonathan Browne

he United States government releases the 2021 Trafficking in Persons report on Liberia, places the country on its Tier 2 Watch List, for failure to meet the minimum standards for the elimination of trafficking. However, it says the Government of Liberia is making significant efforts to do so.

The report released Thursday, July 01, 2021 says, these efforts include opening a new shelter for child trafficking victims, initiating an investigation into a high-profile labor trafficking case in cooperation with foreign governments, and allocating funding to NGOs to conduct

awareness raising campaigns. However, the report says the government did not demonstrate overall increasing efforts

compared to the previous reporting period, even considering the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on its anti-trafficking capacity.

"The government identified fewer victims, initiated fewer investigations, prosecuted fewer defendants, and did not convict any traffickers", the report reads, and observes that law enforcement officials in the country continued to lack adequate resources and understanding investigate and prosecute trafficking crimes, while shelter services for victims remained insufficient, and the government did not support NGOs providing care to victims, hence, Liberia is downgraded to Tier 2 Watch

The report recommends increase efforts to investigate and prosecute trafficking cases, including internal trafficking cases and officials accused of complicity.

It calls for training of law enforcement and judicial officials on identifying, investigating, and prosecuting trafficking cases under the 2005 anti-trafficking law, and

trafficking law to remove the requirement of force, fraud, or coercion in child sex trafficking

It says the government should amended the law to prescribe penalties for adult trafficking that are sufficiently stringent and commensurate with the penalties for other grave crimes; expand victim services, particularly for victims outside the capital, males, and victims requiring long-term care.

It also calls increase financial or in-kind support to NGOs that support trafficking victims as well as allocation of financial and in-kind resources, as feasible, to the anti-trafficking task force, among others.





COVID-19 : Le gouvernement devrait aller au-delà des simples mesures barrières

Le fait que le gouvernement du Libéria, par l'intermédiaire du ministère de la Santé, a publié la semaine dernière des directives nationales révisées sur la COVID-19 après l'augmentation du nombre de décès et des personnes infectées au quotidien montre que le gouvernement joue du bout des lèvres avec le peuple libérien quant à la gestion de la pandémie.

C'est un secret de polichinelle que les autorités ici, même au plus haut niveau, rechignent à appliquer les mesures de prévention de la COVID, en encourageant des rassemblements de masse, comme c'est le cas lors de la tournée nationale du président George Weah au cours des trois à quatre derniers mois, où les barrières, la distanciation sociale, le lavage des mains et le port des masques ont été totalement ignorés.

La résurgence du virus au Libéria est attribuée à une nouvelle variante indienne qui est plus mortelle que celle qui venait de Wuhan, en Chine, en 2019.

En moins d'un mois, le taux de mortalité n'est pas seulement alarmant, mais effrayant.

Avec des frontières poreuses et mal surveillées à travers le pays, associées à une sécurité plutôt détendue au principal aéroport international Roberts qui a été témoin d'un afflux de visiteurs étrangers, en particulier d'Inde et d'autres pays asiatiques au cours de cette même période, on devrait s'attendre au pire. Ce n'était qu'une question de temps.

Maintenant, nous voici en tant que nation, toutes les lumières de toute la région de la CEDEAO étant braquées sur nous. Nous sommes désormais considérés comme ceux qui représentent un risque pour les 14 autres États membres.

Les mesures nationales révisées publiées dernièrement sont ainsi dénuées de sens. Il faut au contraire des mesures strictes à tous les niveaux sans crainte ni faveur. Il nous faut un leadership exemplaire cette fois-ci si nous voulons réussir ce combat.

L'un des problèmes critiques des directives qui continuent de faire l'objet de critiques est d'autoriser le maintien de l'ouverture des lieux de rassemblement comme les bars et les boites de nuit jusqu'à 21h00! C'est comme si on donnait une carte blanche aux gens de propager le virus.

Nous avons du mal à comprendre comment un groupe de personnes ivres dans un bar peut observer la distanciation sociale, pour ne pas dire le port de masques. Le gouvernement dit penser aux conséquences économiques de la fermeture de ces lieux. Mais il semble ignorer les répercussions imprévues des activités dans ces lieux.

Le Département d'État a déclaré que les critères et les procédures d'attribution des licences et des contrats d'extraction de ressources naturelles étaient décrits dans la loi, bien qu'il y ait eu des rapports de corruption et d'application incohérente des réglementations dans la pratique. Il a indiqué que des informations de base sur l'attribution d'une partie de l'extraction de ressources naturellesétait accessible au public.

Le rapport a révélé que 74 des 141 gouvernements examinés au cours de la période ont rempliles exigences minimales de transparence budgétaire, tandis que dix-sept des 67 gouvernements qui n'ont pas respecté les exigences minimales ont fait des progrès significatifs.

"La transparence budgétaire est un élément essentiel d'une gestion efficace des finances publiques.Elle permet de renforcer la confiance des marchés privés et sous-tend la durabilité économique", a dit le rapport, avant d'ajouterque la transparencebudgétaire favorise une plus grande responsabilité du gouvernement en offrant une

fenêtre sur les budgets gouvernementaux pour les citoyens, leur permettant non seulement de demander des comptes à leurs leaders, mais aussi de participer aux débats publicsen étant bien informés.

RISBANE - Au moment où les pays développés commencent à croire qu'ils ont traversé le pire de la crise de la COVID-19, deux réalités frappantes se font sentir. Il semble tout d'abord évident à quel point la plupart des pays en développement subissent l'escalade des éclosions épidémiques du type que l'on constate en Inde. Les conséquences d'une distribution des vaccins les plus efficaces de manière équitable et stratégique sont mises à nu.

Deuxièmement, avec des variants du virus plus virulents et contagieux qui se déclarent encore, nous n'avons pas le luxe de retarder les travaux visant à établir un nouveau système international de préparation et de riposte aux pandémies. Nous devons amorcer ce projet dès maintenant. Heureusement, le Groupe indépendant sur la préparation et la riposte aux pandémies (GIPR), coprésidé par l'ex-première ministre de la Nouvelle-Zélande Helen Clark et par une ancienne présidente du Liberia Ellen Johnson Sirleaf, vient de publier un plan décrivant en détail la marche à suivre.

La question est maintenant de savoir si les autorités nationales sont prêtes à écouter, mais également à agir. La réponse déterminera si l'on peut empêcher les épidémies futures de se transformer en catastrophes mondiales. Je sais de l'expérience de mon propre gouvernement durant la pandémie de la grippe porcine (H1N1) de 2009 qu'il est crucial de contrer ces crises par des interventions immédiates, coordonnées à grande échelle. Grâce à huit mois de travaux par le GIPR, les responsables politiques sont maintenant dotés d'un ensemble complet de recommandations pour transformer le mode de gestion des risques de

Au cœur des propositions du groupe, on retrouve un appel pour un degré plus élevé de préparation et de riposte aux pandémies. L'appel a été lancé aux plus hauts échelons des directions politiques par l'entremise de la création d'un nouveau conseil de sécurité mondial sur les menaces sanitaires, qui serait sis au siège des Nations unies à New York. Le groupe a également proposé une Facilité internationale de financement (FIF) pour la vaccination qui contribuerait à répartir la charge des crises sanitaires mondiales futures. Que ce soit par des contributions directes ou par une sorte de contribution obligatoire, ce mécanisme financerait autant les mesures préparatrices que les interventions d'urgence dans les pays à faible et moyen revenu.

Le GIPR a offert la sorte d'encadrement formel, impartial et réalisable dont les autorités nationales ont besoin et — dans ce cas - qui l'ont réclamé auprès de l'Organisation mondiale de la santé. Il y a quatre ans, la Commission indépendante sur le multilatéralisme (ICM), dont j'étais le président) a tenté de sonner l'alarme sur la menace grandissante des pandémies dans son rapport Global Pandemics and Global Public

Health (Pandémies et santé publique mondiale). Les membres de la commission étaient atterrés du piètre état de l'architecture de la santé mondiale à une époque où les crises sanitaires transfrontalières devenaient plus fréquentes et présentaient des risques sans précédent. Ces risques se sont depuis matérialisés sous la forme de la pandémie de la COVID-19.

Outre cet avertissement clair, le rapport de la commission a proposé une série de recommandations audacieuses visant à consolider le système multilatéral devant d'éventuelles crises sanitaires mondiales. Ses propositions pour des règles plus transparentes de vérification et des mécanismes d'alerte rapides se retrouvent dans les recommandations du GIPR, comme son appel pour un secrétariat de l'OMS autonome et doté de plus de moyens. Nous attendons toujours des progrès sur tous ces fronts.

Nous ne pouvons nous permettre de laisser le rapport du GIPR tomber lui aussi dans l'oubli. Et pourtant, c'est exactement ce qui semble se passer. La 74e Assemblée de la santé mondiale vient de voter un délai de six mois pour étudier le rapport du groupe avant même d'envisager une intervention. De tels retards sont simplement inacceptables.

La crise de la COVID-19 a confirmé la vérité dérangeante ressortant du rapport du GIPR, à savoir que la plupart des institutions nationales et internationales créées pour lutter contre les pandémies ne suffisent plus à la tâche, ou dont les fondements étaient inadéquats. Dès la fin de 2019 et au début de 2020 lorsque les réglementations sanitaires internationales ont échoué, l'épidémie de la COVID-19 est devenue une catastrophe mondiale. Et depuis lors, les mesures économiques nationales et internationales se sont avérées trop lentes, mitigées et non coordonnées — une lacune que l'architecture du G20 postérieure à la crise de 2008 était censée éviter.

La crise actuelle pourrait s'empirer, avant que la situation ne s'améliore. On constate déjà un effondrement des chaînes logistiques mondiales, ce qui pourrait avoir de terribles conséquences économiques, politiques et sanitaires. Il faut rectifier le tir pour pouvoir combattre non seulement des pandémies futures, mais également celle qui sévit en ce moment.

Le rapport du GIPR ne pouvait mieux tomber. Le sommet du G7 en Cornouailles du 11 au 13 juin est une occasion de concentrer nos efforts avec l'appui des échelons politiques les plus élevés. La COVID-19 a été très coûteuse pour nous tous. Le rapport de l'ICM de 2017 a anticipé ce qui arriverait un jour et a recensé les solutions que nous aurions besoin de mettre en œuvre. Il est primordial de s'appuyer sur les résultats du GIRP pour adopter des réformes concrètes et faire preuve d'un dynamisme réel, de sorte que cette pandémie soit la dernière à nous avoir pris au dépourvu.

The French President also promised more logistical support and training for the AFL and further cooperation in the area of information exchange.

The discussions also covered the issue of piracy in the Gulf Guinea and the need for both nations to cooperate in order to halt the menace.

The French government further promised more equipment and training for the Liberian Coast Guards, adding that the French Navy will study the option of having its Frigates participate in the fight against piracy in order to ensure that vital maritime commerce is carried out unhindered.

In response, Liberian President George Manneh Weah expressed profound gratitude to the government and people of France for the country's

President Weah called for the continuation of the Franco-Liberia relationship, including the strengthening of collaboration between the French Military and the Armed Forces of Liberia on the Malian peacekeeping mission.

"In this regard", he said, "it is important to note that the Liberian contingent has now been tasked with providing Base Security for the Timbuktu outpost and, as such, more modern equipment and logistics are urgently needed."

Additionally, President Weah enumerated the many other support the French government has rendered to Liberia in recent months, including funding for capacity development, sports, the resumption of flight by Air



French Development totaling an initial amount of 23 million euros.

He assured Mr. Weah that this assistance will be immediate.

President Macron also informed President Weah that his country will make an immediate donation of some 40,000 test kits and several respirators, adding that France will increase its quota to the COVAX structure.

Mr. Macron also said France will ensure that "Liberia directly benefits and have its population vaccinated."

He highlighted the strong historical ties between both nations, saying that both leaders ought to work harder in order to ensure the relationship yields tangible mutual benefits.

The talks covered a wide range of issues, including French support to the Armed Forces of Liberia (AFL) in order to enhance its ability to perform its service in Mali.

continued support of Liberia's development drive, especially in the areas of capacity building, infrastructure development and sports.

President Weah also expressed appreciation for President Macron's "gracious support" towards Liberia's engagements with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the World Bank, which he said has greatly contributed to the improved fiscal and monetary policy implementation and efficiency the country now experiences.

Mr. Weah informed his French counterpart that his administration continues to work in close collaboration with these international financial institutions, "which sometimes require the formulation of difficult policies, such as the Salary Harmonization Policy."

Soldiers ready for deployment

r oldiers of the Armed Forces of Liberia or ■ AFL, have been put on a standby mode ready to be deployed when needed to support health authorities stop the spread of the covid-19 virus.

AFL Chief of Staff Maj. Gen. Prince Charles Johnson, III, said both the infantry and the Liberia Coast Guard have been activated to be on the standby to support health authorities when needed to help.

"We are on the standby just in case, based on the recommendation and our own input to the health authority. We standby to deploy and help to stop the spread," Gen. Johnson said

cumulatively since the crisis began in March 2020 to date, and has also recorded 4,098 cases of the virus cumulatively.

The third wave of the virus is considered more deadly than the previous two waves of the virus experienced last year, and health authorities have been cautioning the public to take health protocols more seriously and be inoculated.

The Army Chief indicated that on 27 June this year, the Ministry of Health visited the 14th Military Hospital which was one of the Covid treatment facilities during the previous waves of Coronavirus, saying the facility is prepared just in case Star Base is overwhelmed by Covid cases.

"Our logistic unit, already we have constructed tents at the RIA [Roberts International Airport]. I

military facilities.

He said the AFL has completed 50 percent of its personnel based on the vaccines that the military got. Gen. Johnson encouraged personnel of the Armed Forces of Liberia, their dependents and the citizenry to continue to follow the health protocols announced by the Ministry of Health and to also get inoculated.

Earlier on the show Thursday, former NPHIL boss Dr. Mosoka Fallah encouraged people with health complications like blood pressure, diabetes and respiratory tract infections to take the vaccines because "once they have the disease, they will accelerate and they will die."

"So instead of you being afraid when you have these conditions, [they] should be all the reasons why you should take this," Dr. Fallah said.

Explaining the importance of taking the two doses of the vaccines, Dr. Fallah, it has been determined that the protection you get from the first dose is not strong enough, but the second dose will prompt up the system to give you the maximum result.

He said this is why people are encouraged to take their second dose to reduce their chances of getting infected, or face less risk even if they were infected, compared to those who didn't take the vaccine at all.

On the aspect of compliance, Dr. Fallah said Liberia needs to start thinking about something called "behavior modification" in Public Health through which people are deprived of certain privileges [if they refuse to abide by certain protocols]. He suggested that people do not have to be jailed due to their refusal to take vaccines, but their privileges can be reduced to include being deprived of riding public buses, going to public places and green zoons being created only for those that have taken the vaccines, among others. "So we can take that same method and use it. People that are difficult we will not put them in jail, but we restrict certain things," he suggested.



Cummings Foundation commits US\$150,000 to Covid fight

he Cummings Africa Foundation has committed US\$150,000, as its initial contribution to the ongoing fight against resurgence of the coronavirus in Liberia.

The head of the Foundation, Mr. Alexander B. Cummings, who is also leader of the opposition Alternative National Congress announced the commitment Thursday,

July 1, 2021 in a statement released in Monrovia.

He says the amount doubles the US\$75,000 the Foundation provided in food and household materials across the country during the lockdown last year, pledging that the Cummings Foundation will continue to do what it can in helping the citizenry during these difficult times, and will assist as best as possible the government in its current response to the

"As I speak, the Foundation is moving quickly to purchase. and hurriedly provide to hospitals, much-needed medical supplies like oxygen, drugs, masks, gloves, gowns, oximeters, cleaning supplies and hand-washing buckets. So far, we have provided oxygen for 50 tanks to Catholic Hospital and procured 20 tanks and 20 regulators for CH Rennie hospital to be delivered this weekend. These are immediate needs we decided to address while the procurement of other materials take time", Mr. Cummings says.

He discloses the Foundation has three-fold approach in the current fight, firstly; it is providing support to some public and private hospitals, secondly, working with community leaders, civil society organizations, and the media to increase public awareness and messaging especially around prevention. COVID-19 attacks 13 cou-Health Minister discloses

he Minister of Health and head of the government's Incident Management System Dr. Wilehmina Jallah, discloses here that 13 of the 15 counties of Liberia are battling the third wave of the deadly COVID-19.

Addressing the regular press briefing at the Ministry of Information Thursday, July 1, 2021, she said from the

inception of the third wave of the virus in March, Montserrado county, now considered the high zone, was among few counties that were in respond, but as of June 30th the number has increased to 13 with the exception of River Gee and Grand Kru counties.

"The number of counties that are now in respond clearly indicates that we should continue our mask wearing, social distancing and follow all of



the health protocols, and abide by the measures that were provided by the government; with this we can defeat this virus", the Minister said.

Doctor Jallah emphasizes that the entire COVID-19 fight rests in the hands of every citizen, noting that no one should wait on the government.

However, critics say the government should do more and take leadership by improving scrutiny at the Roberts International Airport,
