## Sudan blames dark forces for failed coup

Sudan says that people linked to the ousted President Omar al-Bashir were behind Tuesday's failed coup attempt.

A spokesman blamed "forces of darkness" adding that those involved have been arrested.

Bashir, who had been in power for three decades, was toppled two years ago.

The current administration - involving the military, civilian representatives and protest groups - was then established as part of a power-sharing agreement.

The coup plotters had tried to take over a building housing the state media, AFP news agency reports.

Earlier reports from the capital Khartoum and nearby Omdurman described intense military activity, and the main bridge across the River Nile was shut.

"We're not going back... there are people trying to turn back the hands of time,"

said Information Minister Hamza Baloul in a statement read on state TV, blaming "remnants" of the old regime for Tuesday's failed putsch.

He added that "forces of darkness were targeting the revolution" started by mass popular protests against then-President Bashir, but said

government bodies would be the "first line of defence" protecting Sudan's transition.

Several coup attempts have taken place in Sudan in the years since President Bashir was toppled, the BBC's media monitoring service reports.

There has been tension

within the Sovereign Council which is supposed to be overseeing a return to civilian rule. BBC Monitoring adds that some are claiming the security lapses in parts of the country may be an attempt by the military to obstruct the transfer of power back to civilians.

Correspondents say elements within the military are thought to be behind several of days of protests in Port Sudan in the east of the country.

The Sudanese government says the situation in the country is now "under control".

Video footage shared on Tuesday morning appeared to

show armoured vehicles on city streets, but AFP news agency reports that traffic is now flowing smoothly in central Khartoum.

Mohanad Hashim, a journalist for government-run Sudan TV in Khartoum, reports that the Bashir loyalists blamed for the coup say they are disgruntled with Sudan's tough economic situation.

The BBC's Africa correspondent Catherine Byaruhanga says Sudan's transitional government is under pressure to deliver economic and political reforms amid competing demands from conservative and liberal constituencies. BBC

## Arrest made in Rwanda over volleyball scandal

The vice-president of the Rwanda Volleyball Federation (FRVB), Jean de Dieu Bagirishya, has been arrested following the country's disqualification from the Women's African Championship.

Rwanda, who were hosting the event, were thrown out of the tournament on Sunday for fielding four ineligible players. Bagirishya is "suspected to have used forged documents in exercising his functions",

Thierry Murangira, a spokesperson for the Rwanda Investigation Bureau (RIB), told BBC Great Lakes. "Investigations continue to establish the role of other federation members," he added. Bagirishya, a local sports journalist who is better known as Jado Castar, has not commented on the allegations against him.

He can now be held in custody for up to five days as he is investigated before the case is handed to state prosecutors, who will decide to file charges or release him.

An investigation was

launched after Nigeria and Morocco both lodged complaints over Rwanda's use of four Brazilian players as the hosts beat both teams in the group stage of the championship.

On Sunday, it was ruled that Rwanda, who had been due to play in the semi-finals, had used the Brazilians without the proper clearance.

Cameroon retained their Women's African Volleyball title after beating Kenya by three sets to one in Rwanda on Sunday. BBC

## Zuma too sick to appear in court - lawyer

South Africa's former President Jacob Zuma has failed to appear at the High Court in Pietermaritzburg for the resumption of his corruption trial. His lawyer has told the judge that Mr Zuma could not attend for medical reasons. He is facing 16 counts of fraud and racketeering related to an arms deal in the 1990s.

Mr Zuma denies the charges, insisting they're politically motivated. The 79 year old is already serving a 15-month sentence for failing to testify in a separate corruption inquiry.

He was recently granted medical parole and is recovering from surgery. His arrest sparked a wave of violence in which more than 300 people were killed. BBC

## Pro-lobbyists Vs. Anti-lobbyists

WHILE THE GOVERNMENT of Liberia recently announced the hiring of a CNN commentator to lobby on its behalf in Washington D.C. for U.S. support and subsequent presence of a high-level Weah government delegation headed by Minister of State for Presidential Affairs Nathaniel F. McGill in the United States, holding discussions with U.S officials including Congressional Members, a counter-lobby force is perhaps steps ahead, working against interest of the Weah administration.

THE COUNTER-LOBBY GROUP, the Liberia Renaissance Office Inc. reportedly with a US\$180,000 budget is registered by Alan White and Jeffery Birrell to campaign for U.S. government support to the opposition bloc in Liberia working under the canopy, Collaboration Political Parties (CPP) seeking to defeat President George Manneh Weah in 2023.

IN SHORT, TWO groups of Liberians from the government and the Opposition are competing to get Washington's attention in a campaign clouded by selfish political interest and motives.

ACCORDING TO REPORT, the Liberia Renaissance Office in Monrovia is headed by an ex-minister from the former Sirleaf administration Sylvester Grigsby, with key opposition leaders, including Mr. Alexander B. Cummings of the Alternative National Congress/CPP behind its activities, though it has not been independently established.

BUT WHY WOULD two separate groups with separate interest compete to seek support from the U.S. Government when realities on the ground in Liberia are not impressive by any measure? Here is an opposition bloc that is bent on self-destructing on one hand, and a government that is nursing impunity, corruption with poor human rights record and lack of accountability on the other.

LIKE IT IS OFTEN said, deeds, not words that matter. No amount of lobby would change anything if either side is walking backward rather than moving ahead. When university, tertiary and secondary education are crumbling before our very eyes and health is more symbolic than practical with insecurity sending residents indoors as early as 8pm then lobby cannot change reality.

SIMILARLY, WHEN THE opposition is allegedly spending US\$180,000 to get Washington on its side, while tearing itself apart in Liberia, it does not present a serious face to gain attention.

COMMONLY, WASHINGTON IS fully abreast of situations in Liberia so hiring lobbyists to white-wash would short-live because a monkey cannot change its black hands regardless how much detergent it applies in washing off the dirt.

THE LOBBYISTS IN Washington would do well if they adapt sincerity in public service and prioritize interest of Liberians above selfish political interest rather than threading on deceit, lies and greed.

## Vaccine Producers Must Step Up

NEW YORK - The world stands at a critical juncture of the COVID-19 pandemic. Countries that lack the first round of vaccine coverage are extraordinarily vulnerable to the highly infectious Delta variant, and are also seedbeds for new variants that could quickly spread worldwide. The Lancet COVID-19 Commission, which I chair, is working urgently with the United Nations system to strengthen the multilateral response. Governments of countries where vaccines are being produced - the United States, European Union members, the United Kingdom, India, Russia, and China - need to cooperate under UN leadership to ensure that a sufficient supply of vaccine doses reaches the poorest countries.

The high-income countries now have more than 50% of their population fully vaccinated. Yet the fully vaccinated population in Africa remains under 4%. This lack of vaccine coverage in Africa, and in low-income countries elsewhere, poses an imminent danger to these populations.

US President Joe Biden has called for a vaccine summit on September 22. This is potentially a highly significant step forward. It is important that the US hold this meeting in cooperation with China, India, Russia, and the other vaccine-producing countries, and with the UN system. Only the UN, with its universal membership and its operational capacity in low-income countries, has the ability to coordinate the rapid global scale-up of vaccine coverage.

In April 2020, the UN created the COVID-19 Vaccine Global Access (COVAX) facility to provide vaccines to lower-income countries. These countries expected COVAX to provide timely deliveries. Yet COVAX has been unable to buy a sufficient volume of vaccine doses mainly because high-income countries have repeatedly cut to the front of the queue. Moreover, the vaccine-producing countries' governments have imposed export quotas so that COVAX is often unable to secure even the vaccines for which it has contracts. The company shareholders are of course happy with these arrangements, because the rich countries pay more for the doses than COVAX would.

The supply crisis facing low-income countries in Africa and elsewhere will not resolve itself. On the contrary, high-income countries are now beginning to offer a third dose, even before highly vulnerable groups in the poorest countries (the elderly, health workers, the immunocompromised, and others) have received their primary vaccination.

Global opportunities for scaling up vaccine production are also being hampered by some governments' continued insistence on enforcing the patents on key vaccine technologies, even though these patents are held by academic institutions that were funded by the governments (notably by the

US National Institutes of Health). Likewise, public money funded the clinical trials and rollout of the vaccines. Despite the global urgency of the pandemic, life-saving public goods have been privatized.

The World Health Organization has set minimum targets for vaccine coverage in every country - at least 10% of the population by end-September 2021, 40% by end-2021, and 70% by end-June 2022 - that the current vaccine allocation system will not achieve. At this moment of great global peril, the governments of the vaccine-producing countries should take the following steps:

First, when governments meet this week at Biden's vaccine summit, they should chart a path to achieve the WHO targets in all countries, including 40% global coverage by the end of this year. The vaccine producers should cooperate fully by disclosing all existing orders (and prices) on their books, so that the UN and governments can prioritize under-served countries.

Second, the UN system, with the full support of governments and companies, should set delivery timelines for every low-income country aligned with the WHO targets. The WHO and COVAX, and other UN agencies such as UNICEF, should work with the recipient countries to scale up the "last-mile" deployment systems for the arrival of the vaccine doses.

Third, the new \$650 billion allocation of special drawing rights just approved by the International Monetary Fund should be used, in conjunction with other emergency financial resources, to ensure that short-term financing constraints pose no obstacles to the supply of vaccines.

Fourth, the governments of the vaccine-producing countries should agree, in line with long-standing trade agreements on public health, to waive intellectual property rights and to promote technology sharing in order to increase global vaccine production. Promising vaccines that are now in clinical trials should also be supported with official financing for rapid production and deployment upon regulatory approval.

Lastly, governments in all countries should make clear to the public that the vaccines are not sufficiently effective on their own to suppress the community transmission of the coronavirus. Additional public health measures - including face masks, physical distancing, contact tracing, and limits on indoor gatherings - are still needed.

The bottom line is that we must treat universal vaccine coverage as an urgently needed global public good, not as an eventual outcome of market forces. Biden's vaccine summit this week can provide the vital breakthrough we need, by empowering the UN with the vaccine doses and finances it needs to ensure immunization for all.







## Les producteurs de vaccins doivent redoubler d'efforts

NEW YORK - Le monde est à la croisée des chemins de la pandémie de COVID-19. Les pays qui ont manqué le premier rendez-vous de couverture vaccinale sont extrêmement vulnérables au variant Delta à très forte contagiosité. Ils sont également des foyers pour les nouveaux variants qui risquent de se répandre dans le monde entier. La Commission COVID-19 de The Lancet, sous ma direction, fait tout ce qui est en son pouvoir au sein du système des Nations Unies en vue de renforcer une réponse multilatérale. Les gouvernements des pays producteurs de vaccins (États-Unis, pays membres de l'Union européenne, Royaume-Uni, Inde, Russie, Chine), doivent coopérer sous la direction des États-Unis afin d'assurer un approvisionnement suffisant en doses de vaccin à destination des pays les plus pauvres.

Plus de la moitié de la population des pays à revenu élevé est à présent entièrement vaccinée. Pourtant le pourcentage de population entièrement vaccinée en Afrique reste inférieur à 4 %. Ce manque de couverture vaccinale en Afrique et dans les pays à faible revenu ailleurs dans le monde constitue un danger imminent pour ces populations.

Le président américain Joe Biden a appelé à un sommet sur les vaccins le 22 septembre. Cela représente une avancée très importante. Il est important que les États-Unis organisent cette réunion en coopération avec la Chine, l'Inde, la Russie et les autres pays producteurs de vaccins, ainsi qu'avec le système des Nations Unies. Seule l'ONU, avec son adhésion universelle et sa capacité opérationnelle dans les pays à faible revenu, a la capacité de coordonner l'intensification mondiale rapide de la couverture vaccinale.

En avril 2020, l'ONU a créé le Mécanisme pour un accès mondial aux vaccins contre la COVID-19 (COVAX), dans le but de fournir des vaccins aux pays à faible revenu. Ces pays s'attendaient à ce que le COVAX fournisse des livraisons en temps opportun. Pourtant le COVAX n'a pas été en mesure d'acheter un volume suffisant de doses de vaccin, principalement parce que les pays à revenu élevé se sont à plusieurs reprises mis en première ligne de la file d'attente. En outre, les gouvernements des pays producteurs de vaccins ont imposé des quotas d'exportation de sorte que le COVAX s'est souvent trouvé dans l'impossibilité d'assurer même les vaccins pour lesquels il avait reçu des contrats. Les actionnaires des firmes pharmaceutiques sont bien sûr satisfaits de ces arrangements, parce que les pays riches paient plus cher pour les doses, par rapport au tarif que le COVAX aurait dû payer.

La crise de l'offre qui touche les pays à faible revenu d'Afrique et d'ailleurs ne va pas se résoudre d'elle-même. Au contraire, les pays à revenu élevé commencent en ce moment à proposer une troisième dose, avant même que les groupes les plus vulnérables des pays les plus pauvres (les personnes âgées, les personnels soignants, les immunodéprimés, etc.) n'aient reçu leur première vaccination.

Les opportunités mondiales d'intensification de la production de vaccin sont également entravées par l'insistance continue de certains gouvernements à appliquer des brevets sur les technologies clés de vaccination, même si ces brevets sont détenus par des institutions

universitaires financées par les pouvoirs publics, notamment par les National Institutes of Health (NIH) des États-Unis. De même, des fonds publics ont financé les essais cliniques et le déploiement des vaccins. Malgré l'urgence mondiale de la pandémie, les biens publics vitaux ont été privatisés.

L'Organisation mondiale de la Santé a fixé des objectifs minimaux de couverture vaccinale dans tous les pays - au moins 10 % de la population d'ici fin septembre 2021, 40 % d'ici fin 2021 et 70 % d'ici fin juin 2022 - que le système actuel d'allocation des vaccins ne parviendra pas à réaliser. En ce moment de grand danger mondial, les gouvernements des pays producteurs de vaccins doivent prendre les mesures suivantes :

Tout d'abord, lorsque les gouvernements se réuniront cette semaine au sommet sur les vaccins de Biden, ils doivent élaborer une stratégie en vue d'atteindre les objectifs de l'OMS dans tous les pays, en particulier une couverture mondiale de 40 % d'ici la fin de l'année. Les producteurs de vaccins doivent coopérer pleinement en divulguant toutes les commandes (et tous les prix) existant dans leurs registres, afin que l'ONU et les gouvernements puissent donner la priorité aux pays sous-desservis.

Deuxièmement, le système des Nations Unies, avec le plein soutien des gouvernements et des entreprises, doit fixer des délais de livraison pour chaque pays à faible revenu alignés sur les objectifs de l'OMS. L'OMS et le COVAX, ainsi que d'autres organismes des Nations Unies comme l'UNICEF, doivent collaborer avec les pays bénéficiaires pour étendre les systèmes de déploiement du « dernier kilomètre » dans l'acheminement des doses de vaccin.

Troisièmement, la nouvelle allocation de 650 milliards de dollars de droits de tirage spéciaux qui vient d'être approuvée par le Fonds monétaire international doit être utilisée, conjointement avec d'autres ressources financières d'urgence, pour s'assurer que les contraintes de financement à court terme ne représentent aucun obstacle à l'approvisionnement en vaccins.

Quatrièmement, les gouvernements des pays producteurs de vaccins doivent convenir, conformément aux accords commerciaux de longue date sur la santé publique, de renoncer aux droits de propriété intellectuelle et de promouvoir le partage des technologies afin d'accroître la production mondiale de vaccins. Les vaccins prometteurs actuellement en cours d'essais cliniques doivent également être soutenus par un financement officiel pour une production rapide et pour l'adoption de plans de déploiement commun.

Enfin, les gouvernements de tous les pays doivent faire comprendre au public que les vaccins ne sont pas suffisamment efficaces à eux seuls pour empêcher la transmission communautaire du coronavirus. D'autres mesures de santé publique - notamment les masques, la distanciation physique, la recherche de cas contacts et la limitation des rassemblements en intérieur - sont encore nécessaires.

En conclusion, nous devons considérer la couverture vaccinale universelle comme un bien public mondial urgent et non comme un résultat final des forces du marché. Le sommet de Biden sur les vaccins de cette semaine peut apporter l'avancée décisive que nous attendons, en dotant l'ONU des doses de vaccins et des financements nécessaires pour assurer la vaccination de tous.

# Suspect charged for mans laughtering wheelbarrow man

Police authorities in Monrovia have charged a 40 - year - old man identified as Nyanford W. T. Benson, Jr., with manslaughter for allegedly beating on a wheelbarrow rider, victim Johnson Tokpah in the Gobachop Market in Paynesville, leading to the victim's death.

Police are also in search of two others, Michael Benson and Diamond in relation to the case.

"Based on the fact and circumstances surrounding the incident, this investigation has resolved to charge suspect Nyanford W. T. Benson with the crime of manslaughter in violation of Chapter 14, Section 14.2 of the Penal Code of the Republic of Liberia for his involvement in the beating of victims Johnson Tokpah which led to his death," a police charge sheet noted.

It detailed that investigation shows that victim Johnson Tokpah on Monday, 16 August 2021, between 8:00-900pm, suspect Benson and Diamond, all to be identified, entered an entertainment center and Benson used his belt from his waist and beat victim Johnson, a wheelbarrow rider within the Gobachop Community, Paynesville.

Police said victim Johnson questioned suspect Benson, saying "My son what did I do that you are beating me with the belt?"

In reply, police added, suspect Benson said to the old

man, that "Am I your son?" and continue to beat on the wheelbarrow rider.

After victim Johnson was beaten outside of the entertainment center by suspects Nyanford W. T. Benson, Michael Benson and Diamond to be identified, police said they all fled from the scene and went into hiding.

But community members organized themselves and took the victims to a community - based clinic within the Gobachop Market area for treatment.

On 17 August 2021, victim Johnson was discharged from the Medicare Clinic and taken home to continue treatment.

Police noted that on 18 August while victim Johnson was returning to the clinic for further treatment, he collapsed and fell on the ground and went unconscious.

His lifeless body was examined by a fifteen-man coroner jury supervised by the County Coroner of Montserrado and the victim's body was deposited at the Alfred Butler Funeral Home for preservation.

The police investigative finding said that even though suspect Nyanford W. T. Benson denied all allegations levied against him, with their investigation they have charged him for manslaughter while suspect Michael Benson and Diamond are charged with manslaughter and criminal facilitation, pending court trial whenever they are arrested.--

# Health workers lament conditions of work

"The International Labour Organization or (ILO) Conventions 87 and 98 should be respected and implemented to the fullest. That we have come a long way

She pointed out that all trade unions in Liberia need this when it comes to where they came from, where they are, where they want to go now on public sector issues, adding that the workshop was organized to disseminate information to trade unions.

# My expulsion belated

**D**ethroned People's Liberation Party (PLP) chairman Wilmot Paye says the party's announcement of his expulsion Monday, 20 September 2021 is a late response to his formally written resignation both as acting chairman and member of PLP on 17 September 2021.

"What they are doing is just a lately response to what we did last week, because on the 17th which was Friday, we submitted, I officially distanced myself from the party," said Mr. Paye in a phone interview with the NewDawn newspaper Tuesday, 21 September 2021.

"And I wrote the

unilaterally violating the constitutional rights of other members of the party.

Paye's exit from the PLP after his short stay was in less than two years, a second damage of a political marriage with a party he had been chairing.

Prior to joining PLP, Paye was similarly expelled from the former ruling Unity Party (UP) which he chaired for years during former President Ellen Johnson - Sirleaf's administration up to the time of his removal in early 2020 that prompted him to sue UP in February 2020, seeking declaratory judgment for his reinstatement.

He lost the court case and failed to be reinstated as member or official of UP before

tendencies that are inimical to its objectives, citing a growing concern he and his colleagues had expressed about alleged premature campaigning by PLP Vision Bearer Dr. Daniel E. Cassell and the wrongful display of his photos without due regard for the National Election Law.

In that letter, Paye states that its primary purpose is to inform the NEC about his decision to completely distance himself from the PLP both as acting interim chair and member, respectively, effective 17 September.

He informed the commission that he and his colleagues were concerned about what looked like violations of the Election Law, and they did their utmost to advise against possible violations, but their counsel was ignored.

"Accordingly, I herewith withdraw my name, phone numbers and email details which were submitted to the Commission for contact and other purposes from the Official Contact List, WhatsApp Chatroom or Directory of Political Parties," Paye wrote the NEC.

Through its General Policy Commission (GPC), the PLP on Monday said it officially expelled Mr. Paye, Mr. Henry Sackie, Kansualism Kansuah, Carlos Edison Tingban, Peddi Ross and Reuben Washington for similar reasons for allegedly violating the norms, code of values, and ethics of the party.

PLP said in a communication addressed to Mr. Paye under the signature of its Acting National Organizing Chairman Mr. Tapple E. Doe, it informed the dethroned acting PLP national chairman that since his removal, he continued to misrepresent himself in the public as chairman of the party.

The party claimed that Mr. Paye and the others have been engaged in fabricating stories, which have no iota of truth to besmear the party's image and bring it to public ridicule.
