






Central African Nations Vow to Reduce Imports to Spur Job Creation

AOUNDÉ, CAMEROON African states meeting Friday in Cameroon announced reductions and bans on some imports to encourage local production and create jobs.

The leaders from Cameroon, the Central African Republic, Chad, Equatorial Guinea, Gabon, and the Republic of Congo say the ongoing economic slowdown is stifling development, increasing food and fuel prices, and making living conditions unbearable for a majority the region's 55 million people.

Daniel Ona Ondo, president of the Central African Economic and Monetary Community, CEMAC, said conference attendees decided that Central African states will tackle the crisis by reducing or stopping imports of clothing,

Ondo said CEMAC, through its Leaders of Central financial reforms program, is allocating about \$5 million for projects, including import substitutions, over the next five years. He said the funds will be raised through contributions from member states and loans.

> Before Russia's invasion of Ukraine, Central African states relied on Russia and Ukraine for 80 percent of their wheat imports and 60 percent of petroleum products. Russia's invasion caused disruptions in supply and price hikes, including a 40 percent spike in the cost of fuel.

> CEMAC said most of the imported products could be grown locally.

Cameroon's President Paul Biva, outgoing chairperson of the CEMAC Conference of Heads of State, said solidarity is needed among CEMAC member states to put an end to several crises that are making living conditions difficult and causing despair among civilians.

Police Fire Tear Gas at Mozambican Rapper's Memorial

MOZAMBIQUE -Mozambique police fired tear gas and rubber bullets at protesters planning a march Saturday in memory of a rapper vocal in his criticism of the government, Human Rights Watch said.

The sudden death of Edson da Luz, known by his stage name Azagaia, has sparked rare anti-government demonstrations in the southern African country.

On Saturday, more than a thousand people were expected to take part in a memorial march in central Maputo, with rallies also planned in other cities.

But in the capital, a heavy police presence prevented the procession from taking place.

"They didn't allow people to gather," said Zenaida Machado, a senior researcher with HRW in Mozambique, pointing out that the rally had been authorized by city authorities. "Without any sign of violence from the protesters, they started throwing tear gas, and rubber bullets."

Social media footage showed anti-riot police with armored vehicles and dogs firing tear gas as they dispersed small groups of demonstrators.

Confronting the Global Water Crisis

ONDON - The world's water crisis can no Fourth, we must phase out some \$700 billion of change nor meet most of the Sustainable environmentally damaging practices - and reduce Development Goals (SDGs).

Last year's unprecedented floods, droughts, cyclonic storms, and heatwaves showed what is coming. But while such disasters garner plenty of attention, the underlying water crisis does not. EDITORIAL A little too late Mr. President

PRESIDENT GEORGE Weah on Tuesday, March 14, issued Executive Order #117 consistent with amended Sections 5.2 and 10.2 of the 2014 Code of Conduct requiring appointed public officials seeking elective posts to resign at least one year before the pending election.

THE ACT provides that all officials appointed by the President including all cabinet ministers, deputy, and assistant cabinet ministers, ambassadors, ministers consuls, superintendents of counties, and other Government officials, both military and civilian, appointed by the President pursuant to Article 56(a) of the 1986 Constitution, and any managing director, deputy managing director, assistant managing director of corporation owned by the Government of Liberia, any commissioner, deputy and assistant commissioner of any commission established by the Legislature, and any official of the Government who negotiates and executes contracts, procure goods and services, and/or manages assets for and on behalf of the Government of Liberia, who desires to canvass or contest for an elective public office within the Government of Liberia shall resign his or her position one (1) year before the date on which the election for the post for which he/she intends to contest.

THE REASONS given by the framers which the President acknowledged in his Executive Order #117 is to dissociate the fiduciary duty of trust, integrity and loyalty owed by public officials to the people from their personal desires to contest elections at the expense of public resources.

MORE BESIDES, the intent of the framers of the Code of Conduct particularly the amended Sections 5.2 and 10.2 is to create a level playing field for all Liberians wishing to contest in a pending election.

HOWEVER, THE President's Executive Order has come less than six months before the pending general and presidential elections, more than six months beyond the resignation deadline provided by the amended 2014 code of conduct for appointed public officials seeking elective posts in a pending election.

ASKING APPOINTED public officials wanting to contest in the 2023 general and presidential elections which is less than six months away to resign by April 7, something that should have been done more than six months ago only questions the sincerity of the President in the implementation of the law. This could even open the President's order to legal challenges as was witnessed in 2017, though, this time, in a different fashion.

THE PRESIDENT and team could argue that the law which initially stated two years was amended and printed into Hand Bill on December 29, 2022, therefore, even if the President had made the pronouncement in January, it would still have not met the one-year deadline.

HOWEVER, BEING aware of an election and making the pronouncement in the first week of January would have been seen as a good fate because of the time the law was passed and printed into handbills and not less than six months before the election date.

WHAT IS not done well is just not done at all. The law says resign one year to election, not less than six months. This is too little too late Mr. President.

Is Liberia turning into a gangster's paradise?

In his 1995 hit song "Gangster's Paradise", the late Coolio described a life full of uncertainties in an environment where gang activities or other criminal activities were common and glorified by locals.

The first verse of Coolio's lyrics: "As I walk through the valley of the shadow of death / I take a look at my life and realize there's nothin' left." The second verse which followed the chorus is even more graphic: I'm livin' life do or die, what can I say? I'm 23 now, but will I live to see 24? The way things is goin' I don't know."

Liberia seems not to be too far from this scenario. As the crime rate increases, many go to bed fearing that they will wake up the next day. The fear of attacks from armed robbers is high because not even your neighbors would come to your rescue before the police who are logistically challenged.

The wave of crimes has increased amidst the breakdown of cultural and moral values leaving the larger population vulnerable.

Back in the days, of prewar Liberia, each one would look out for the otherthat was the value that held communities together. A shout of rogue, rogue in a house meant calling the community as a whole to your rescue—the case of Cllr. Gloria Musu Scott is an example of many.

Thieves were very discrete in their stealing in prewar Liberia not as is done in the broad day nowadays, most time getting away with impunity.

The country is also witnessing an increase in violence and thuggery not just against public officials, particularly those close to power but also against vulnerable members of our society-Interestingly most of these acts of violence take place in public glare.

Broad day robbery and attack on ordinary citizens by drug addicts commonly referred to here as "Zogoes" has become a regular daily feature here and no one dare intervene to rescue the victim.

All of these summed up the breakdown in social and cultural norms. What is more concerning now is that this gangsterism and thuggeries have permeated our schools and shamefully at the country's highest institution of learning.

Nearly a week ago, there was an attack on Mr. Alloysius Howe, a Special aid to Finance and Development Minister Samuel Tweah by some members of the University of Liberia campus-based Student Unification Party (SUP).

Howe was injured in the process and his vehicle was damaged. There was no condemnation from members of the opposition bloc. In fact, his attack was cheered in some quarters.

This was not the first attack on a public official: Former Minister of State Nathaniel F. McGill was attacked and forced off the UL main campus while on official duty by the same SUP members.

As if that was not enough, Vice President Jewel Howard Taylor was chased off campus, while launching a program at the same main campus on Capitol Hill.

Former Solicitor General Cllr, Saymah Cyrenus Cephus was also chased off campus, while visiting there weeks later. No punitive measure has been taken against these students and so they have made it a new normal.

On December 24, 2022, zogoes armed themselves with cutlasses and machetes and invaded the city's main market center where buyers and shoppers had gone to trade. Stores were shot as early as 3 pm on Christmas eve because of fear that these drug addicts who roam the streets would regroup and launch an attack after brave marketers foiled their first attack.

According to Urban Dictionary, a gangster paradise is a town where gang activity or other criminal activity is common and glorified by the locals.

When people celebrate the misery or misfortunes of others and justify that such attacks are necessary on individuals perceived to be corrupt or corrupt, it makes our county no different from a gangster paradise where crimes are committed with impunity.

Coolio would go on to say, "why are we so blind to see when the ones we hurt are you and me."



The incumbent is a member of USAID/Liberia's Health Team. This position reports directly to the Health Team Leader or his/her designate.

Major Duties and Responsibilities

Provides program and administrative support in the management of USAID/Liberia's Health activities: 80%

- Supports the Health Project Management Specialist and USDH Health Team Leader in developing and monitoring activities, which address health issues; attends project committee meetings and makes oral and written presentations concerning data related to project monitoring.
- Supports the Health Office in all administrative functions including meeting and motor pool reservations and maintaining adequate office supplies.

However, he said the resources have not reached the people, neither are residents of the town aware if they had such resources in the national budget.

The funds he claimed, were allegedly diverted by Representative Marvin Cole of Bong County to the Kpayah Town Clinic in his district, a clear abuse of power and

La justice que nous réclamons

terrible nouvelle d'une attaque contre le domicile de l'ancienne juge en chef Gloria Musu Scott. Des inconnus ont pris d'assaut son domicile dans la nuit du 22 février et tué la jeune Charloe Musu, l'une de ses filles, une future diplômée de l'Institut Starz de Monrovia. D'autres personnes ont été également blessées. On ignore cependant à l'état actuel leurs conditions.

Au beau matin du 23 février, les Libériens se sont réveillés avec la

L'attaque est survenue après que Scott a signalé deux vagues précédentes d'attaques contre son domicile les 8 et 9 février respectivement. Des voisins ont affirmé avoir entendu des cris et appelé à l'intervention de la police, mais en vain.

L'ancien président de la Commission vérité et réconciliation Jérôme Verdier soupçonne, lui, le maire de la ville de Monrovia Jefferson Koijee et Varlee Telleh, bien qu'il n'ait pas encore fourni de preuves.

Cependant, Koijee et Telleh ont nié tout lien avec l'incident au domicile de l'ancien juge en chef lors de l'interrogatoire de la police la semaine dernière. Il y en a d'autres qui ont également été convoqués pour être interrogés, notamment des agents de sécurité privés et des travailleurs qui avaient travaillé dans l'enceinte pendant la journée à la même date de l'attaque.

Mme Scott et sa famille ont également été interrogées. Les enquêteurs se sont rendus sur les lieux du crime lundi.

Pendant ce temps, les manifestations pacifiques se multiplient. La coalition des groupes de femmes de la société civile demande justice pour les personnes décédées et des procès rapides des coupables qui n'ont pas encore été identifiés ou inculpés.



Violence at the Liberian University Campus: An opposing opinion

bout a month ago, the Liberian University's Student Unification Party (SUP) chased out and threw stones at Aloysius Howe, a staff of Finance Minister Samuel Tweah, from the University's grounds. SUP had done the same to Vice President Jewel Howard Taylor and former Solicitor General Syrenius Cephus. The organization alleged that Howe and the officials were involved in corruption and should not visit the campus. Howe's vehicle was said to have been damaged, and he sustained some injuries. SUP vows to stop those whom it considers corrupt officials from visiting UL, University of Liberia.

Many concerned Liberians denounced SUP's recent action against Howe, saying that the University is a public ground and no one should be denied entrance. In an apparent defiance to SUP, Representative Acarous Gray of District 8 and member of the ruling Congress of Democratic Change party announced on his Facebook page

clash, he was right to have gone to the University. His action was deterrence to SUP's behavior. The organization has no right or power to stop anyone from visiting UL and determining who is corrupt. It is a student group. A silence to its behavior would give license to further unlawful acts. Next time SUP thinks of stopping anyone from coming to the University, it would consider an adverse action. People would more likely stop doing wrong if there is opposition or consequences.

I am also disappointed in individuals and entities that kept quiet about SUP's exercise but are now condemning Rep. Gray. Fairly, they could have also advised SUP not to engage Gray. This could have prevented the confrontation. But the problem is that many Liberian educated elites are alumni of LU and were Supees, members of SUP. Therefore, their loyalty to the party may have blinded them from seeing SUP wrong. Current LU's President, Dr. Julius Nelson, is reported



within hours of the violence against Howe to visit the campus to lunch with students on March 13. SUP responded against the announcement, promising confrontation. The organization also said it would invite Representative Yekeh Kolubah to the University. He is a member of the opposition Alternative National Congress party. He regularly criticizes the ruling party and President George Weah. Kolubah was a former rebel commander for Charles Taylor's NPFL group.

Interestingly, in 2001, the media and eyes witnesses reported that he, as operation director of the Liberian National years of Liberian progressivism, which Police, raided SUP on the LU campus during former President Taylor's rule. That invasion caused the death of two persons. Acarous Gray was a student at the University and is said to have been a SUP member.

Against the advice of some individuals, Representative Gray, with some supporters, marched to the University. This resulted in violence, though Mr. Gray left before Representative Kolubah arrived. Kolubah also came with his followers and criticized the president. Many people, including some legislators, blamed Gray, saying as a leader, he should have exercised tolerance and acted as a respectable lawmaker.

I support Gray's visitation. He is the congressional representative of the area where the University is located. Though he could have canceled the visit upon the advice, and that could have avoided the

to have been a member of SUP when he attended the institution. This condition gives SUP a feeling of control, entitlement, or ownership.

SUP's rival group at the University is the Progressive Student Alliance (PROSA), a party recently founded. Both organizations approach issues differently. However, they use Marxist Leninist revolutionary theory and jargon spoken by and learned from the 70s

SUP is a powerful student political group that started in 1970. The 70s were resulted in the 1980 revolution. Influenced by the progressive forces, the military overthrew the settlers' True Whig Party regime. During the 70s, SUP with research advocated and debated based on issues, not personality or sentiments. SUP's establishment was in response to the Americo-Liberian student power domination at the University. Progressive professors, including Dr. Togba-Nah Tipoteh and Dr. Henry Fahbulleh, motivated its creation.

Its membership was predominantly of native students. SUP has benefitted from former students' support, scholarships, and a general tuition scheme. From student politics and advocacy, it has become an opposition agent to national politics.

On funding to transparency sector, he added that CENTAL observes that the sector is expected to receive increased budgetary support, from \$42,142,578 in 2022 to \$55,404,476 in 2023. According Miamen, CENTAL is pleased




