## UK Estimates Cost of Deporting Each Asylum-seeker to Rwanda Will Be \$215,000

Britain's plan to send asylum seekers to Rwanda will cost \$215,035 per person, according to the first detailed government assessment of a high-stakes promise to tackle record numbers of people arriving in small boats. Prime Minister Rishi Sunak's Conservative government wants to send thousands of

In an economic impact assessment published on Monday, the government said the cost of deporting each individual to Rwanda would include costs such as an average \$133,485 payment to Rwanda for hosting each asylum-seeker, \$28,000 for the

\$4.5 billion currently. "The economic impact assessment clearly shows that doing nothing is not an option," she said.

The government said the potential savings were "highly uncertain," but estimated that to break even the plan would need to have the effect of deterring almost two in five people arriving on small boats.

Labour said the economic assessment was a "complete joke" and it failed to accurately say what the overall cost of the plan would be. The Scottish National Party accused the government of spending an "astronomical" amount of money deporting desperate people while failing to help people in Britain with the rising costs of mortgages and food bills. On Thursday, the Court of Appeal will hand down its judgment on whether the Rwanda flights are lawful. The first planned flight last June was blocked by a last-minute ruling by the European Court of Human Rights, which imposed an injunction preventing any deportations until the conclusion of legal action in Britain. In December, the High Court in London ruled the policy was lawful, but that decision is being challenged by asylum seekers from countries including Syria, Sudan, Iraq, Iran and Vietnam along with some human rights organizations.

## Mob kills man in northern Nigeria over alleged blasphemy

A Muslim man in northern Nigeria has been killed by a mob for alleged blasphemy.

Usman Buda, who worked as a butcher at the Sokoto city abattoir, "was mobbed and attacked by some Muslim faithfuls [who] inflicted serious injuries on him", Sokoto state police spokesman Ahmad Rufa'i is quoted as saying by the AFP news agency.

When the police arrived on the scene, "the mob escaped and left the victim unconscious", he added, the Premium Times reports.

Mr Buda was taken for treatment by police when they went to rescue him but his death was confirmed at the hospital. The authorities are now looking for the alleged perpetrators.

AFP reports that Mr Buda was killed after an argument over some child beggars who had asked for money. It quotes a witness as saying that he got

embroiled in a row after he disapproved of the children. He then made the alleged blasphemous remarks about the Prophet Muhammad.

A gruesome video being shared on social media shows a mob targeting a man with stones as he stumbles and falls.

In response, Sokoto state Governor Ahmed Aliyu "called on

the people of the state to remain calm and law-abiding at all times", but he added that people should not do anything that is capable of degrading the personality of the Prophet Muhammad.

In May last year, a female student was attacked by Muslim students at her college in Sokoto, who killed her and set her body alight. She had been accused of blaspheming.



## President takes early lead in Sierra Leone vote

The first set of results in Sierra Leone's presidential election - with the votes from 60% of the polling stations tallied - show that the incumbent Julius Maada Bio is in the lead. The electoral commission says that he has 56% of the vote. His closest rival Samura Kamara, of the All People's Congress (APC), is on 42%. In order to win in the first round, a candidate needs more than 55% of the vote.

The APC had previously made complaints about the conduct of the election and the electoral commission.

On Sunday, Mr Kamara said live ammunition was fired into his party's headquarters as he held a news conference. A woman there was reportedly wounded and there are fears for her life.

Saturday's vote took place in a tense atmosphere at the culmination of a campaign marred by several violent incidents.

many areas. The election is taking place against the background of a troubled economy, the rising cost of living, and concerns about national unity.

The voters are choosing a president, MPs and councillors in the West African country's fifth election since the civil war ended in 2002.

The 11-year conflict cost an estimated 50,000 lives, but since then the country has a tradition of largely peaceful, free and credible elections, according to Marcella Samba Sesay, chairperson of the NGO National Elections Watch.

With strong party loyalty among the 3.3 million registered voters, the campaigns have focused on shoring up their parties' bases rather than articulating and debating policy issues.

However, voters have told the BBC they want to see concrete change in the country.

"I want a responsible government that will provide jobs, education, improve healthcare and also ensure food security. I expect the new president to work

On Wednesday, Mr Kamara's All People's Congress (APC) alleged that one of its supporters was shot dead by police, which the police have denied. Supporters of both main parties have been accused of attacking opponents.

Accusations of election irregularities were also being thrown on Saturday, after Mr Kamara alleged ballot stuffing and voter suppression in some parts of the country.

However, the electoral body had insisted, in a press conference earlier this week, that they had mechanisms in place to ensure a fair vote. Local media reports that arrests were made.

## The unheeded cry of Liberians

**CONTINUOUS CRY** by many Liberians mainly parents and community residents over proliferation of dangerous substances in the country that are killing many young people across Liberia appears to be falling on deaf ears with authorities here doing very little, if anything at all, to mitigating the problem.

**LIBERIA IS** being saturated with narcotics, including marijuana, heroin, cocaine and 'Kush' that are consumed mainly by youth. Among these tranquilizers, 'Kush' is said to be the most deadly of all with reports of death occurring nearly every other day in one community or another, leaving helpless parents wailing over the loss of a child.

**THE DRUG** situation has intensified under the current administration that has witnessed the separate importation of cocaine valued as high as US\$100 million and nearly \$50 million respectively.

**KUSH, THE** most deadly, is reportedly imported from neighboring Sierra Leone. It is being sold in ghettos across Liberia with state security apparatus, mainly the Liberia Drugs Enforcement Agency (LDEA) lacking capacity to quickly apprehend dealers.

**SUSPECTS BEHIND** two separate consignments of cocaine busted at the Freeport of Monrovia last year, who were arrested and charged by police, were released by Criminal Court 'E' recently after jurors handed down a not guilty verdict.

**BUT THE** ruling by the court and subsequent release of the suspects, all of them foreign nationals, including a Lebanese was received by the public with disappointment. Even the Embassy of the United States in Monrovia that alerted Liberian authorities which led to the arrest, expressed reservation on the release of the suspects.

**NOTWITHSTANDING, THE** drug trade continues to boom across the country, as smugglers exploit Liberia's porous borders, and are in some instances, assisted by deviant immigration officers.

**THE GOVERNMENT** at the highest level has remained conspicuously silent over the drug situation in the country, leaving many to wonder whether it is a complacency.

**COMMUNITY RESIDENTS** continue to cry for government's intervention, as they lose children to peddlers operating ghettos across Monrovia.

**PRESIDENT GEORGE** Weah announced an ambitious program last year to rehabilitate drug-addicted youth that the government brands as "At-risk youth." The President also announced an estimated budget of US\$13 million to construct a rehabilitation center for "At-risk youth" and received commitments from partners.

**BUT IF** recent disclosure by the Minister of Youth and Sports D. Zogar Wilson, is anything to go by, then government's pronouncement is nothing but mere lip-service to fighting drugs that are destroying Liberia's next generation, because the Ministry of Finance and Development Planning, according to Minister Wilson, has not released a dime for this much publicized rehabilitation program. We wonder how many Liberian youth should lose their lives before the drug issue can be treated as a national emergency.

## What It Will Take to Transform Development Finance

**P**ARIS - In a world beset by rising temperatures, extreme weather patterns, and escalating natural disasters, the urgency of decisive action on climate change and the threat of future pandemics has never been more apparent. Both threats will affect us all. But the countries between the Tropics of Cancer and Capricorn - including the Caribbean and Pacific states, and parts of Latin America, Africa, and Asia where another 40% of the global population lives - are currently experiencing loss and damage four times greater than elsewhere.

As we navigate these daunting challenges, we must forge robust partnerships based on trust and respect. The global climate crisis can be tackled only with a global mobilization. The Bridgetown Initiative, launched in Barbados last summer and recently updated, calls on us all to maximize our efforts to prevent and respond to climatic events and pandemics. We must invest now to avert higher costs later. The window is closing, and we must act before irreversible damage is visited on those who can least withstand it.

Our task is fourfold. We need to make the global financial system more shock-resistant. We need to unblock flows of private capital, so that we can accelerate climate-change mitigation and medical research. We need to ramp up long-term, low-cost lending to governments, so that they can make their citizens, communities, and countries more resilient to climate-related disasters and pandemics. And we need to find new non-debt resources to finance post-disaster reconstruction. The Bridgetown Initiative proposes urgent reforms to the global financial architecture to meet these objectives, and it calls for a tripling of concessional loans and grants to the world's poorest countries.

But we must also maximize the availability and use of resources that we can leverage the most: capital at development banks. Multilateral development banks (MDBs) have a unique role to play in the global mission to prevent and respond to climate change and pandemics. Institutions like the European Investment Bank are already ramping up climate-related finance in pursuit of the 2025 goals set at the 2019 United Nations Climate Action Summit.

Looking ahead, better integration with the broader set of public development banks - including national ones, which collectively lend more than \$2 trillion per year - could further improve the effectiveness of existing lending. Estimates by economists Vera Songwe, Nicholas Stern, and Amar Bhattacharya suggest that the developing world needs at least \$350 billion more per year of low-cost finance for building resilience against climate and pandemic risks. That would require a near tripling of MDB lending beyond what is currently extended to the poorest.

To that end, we must make the best use of all forms of existing capital available at the development banks. But since not everyone can pursue this option, we also welcome initiatives to redirect allocations of the International Monetary Fund's special drawing rights (SDRs, the IMF's reserve asset) to multilateral development banks so that they

can boost lending. This is one area where the EIB is actively engaging countries like Rwanda and Barbados.

We also should leverage development-bank balance sheets through risk-sharing and risk transfers - an area where the EIB has much expertise. But to get close to a target of tripling lending for climate resilience, development banks will need more paid-in capital. That is why the updated Bridgetown Initiative includes a call to raise \$100 billion more for the MDBs.

To make the most of this capital, we will need to modernize how we allocate MDB support. While development banks are right to focus on the poorest countries, 70% of the world's poor people live in middle-income countries that are currently ineligible for concessional and grant-like resources. Worse, millions of people are now at risk of becoming poorer in the wake of a climate disaster or a pandemic. Short of changing existing concessional arrangements, we need new long-term, low-cost lending instruments to target investments in building resilience among vulnerable populations in middle-income countries. Hence, the EIB recently approved the extension of loan maturities for sovereign counterparts for up to 30 years, with a ten-year grace period.

Development banks should recognize that in today's world of global shocks, global initiatives are essential to tackle poverty and support climate mitigation, biodiversity, early-warning systems for natural disasters, and pandemic preparedness and response. Success will require sticking to the goal of poverty reduction and growth, but moving beyond narrowly focused projects.

The EIB fully supports these aims and is working toward them in partnership with other MDBs. Following a call to action last year at COP27, the MDB Climate Group is advocating an approach that addresses resilience at the level of whole countries. This means focusing on policy, investment, and capacity-building measures that will foster a green transition in accordance with a country's own priorities. Such an approach will allow us to shift from incremental, project-by-project climate finance to a more comprehensive approach that emphasizes national and global outcomes.

As we navigate the daunting challenges posed by climate change and pandemics, everyone - but especially Europeans and others championing the transition to net-zero emissions - must support expanded financing. With its public-interest model and innovative capabilities, the public development bank system can be the mechanism with which we achieve common global goals. Unless our commitments under the Sustainable Development Agenda and the Paris climate agreement prevail, we will have failed to alleviate the suffering of billions.

We can achieve a sustainable future only by reforming the financial system, scaling up climate investment, and listening to vulnerable states. With our joint commitment to solidarity, fairness, and mutual respect, we must work together to make the Bridgetown Initiative's transformative vision a reality.

# The State and the Market: Adam Smith at 300

**C**AMBRIDGE - This year marks the 300th anniversary of the birth of Adam Smith, the founding father of modern economics. It comes at a time when the global economy faces several daunting challenges. Inflation rates are the highest since the late 1970s. Productivity growth across the West remains sluggish or stagnant. Low- and middle-income countries are teetering on the brink of a debt crisis. Trade tensions are rising. And market concentration has increased among OECD countries.

Against this backdrop, Smith's tercentenary is an opportunity to reflect on his invaluable insights into the dynamics of economic growth and consider whether they can help us understand the current moment.

At the heart of Smith's theory of economic growth, outlined in the first chapter of his seminal work *The Wealth of Nations*, is the specialization facilitated by the division of labor. By breaking down production into smaller tasks - a process illustrated by Smith's famous example of the pin factory - industrialization enabled enormous gains in productivity.

But this process is not confined to individual firms. Since the division of labor, according to Smith, is "limited by the extent of the market," the market as a whole must expand through exchange. After all, boosting daily widget production from 100 to 10,000 is pointless if no one wants to buy widgets. So, the division of labor is a collective process that involves a continuous process of structural economic change. When there is a larger supply of affordable widgets, the widget-using sectors of the economy can expand production and reduce prices. Meanwhile, the market's increased size would allow upstream suppliers of materials required to produce widgets to reorganize production into more specialized tasks.

As the American economist Allyn Young noted in 1928, this is a dynamic story of increasing returns. The growth process is a virtuous circle of structural change that starts slowly and then accelerates, like an avalanche. The Industrial Revolution and the rapid growth of East Asia's "tiger" economies during the 1980s and 1990s are perfect examples of the process Smith identified. And yet the stagnant growth that has plagued developed economies over the past decade raises the question of whether global progress toward what he described as "universal opulence" has ground to a halt.

Although the division of labor into specialized tasks has often enhanced the skills and expertise of workers, this may not always be the case. The emergence of generative artificial-intelligence models has fueled concerns that employers will use these technologies to deskill human workers and cut costs, prompting calls for regulatory interventions to ensure that AI augments, rather than replaces, human capabilities.

Moreover, while economic growth since the onset of the Industrial Revolution has led to astonishing advances in health and well-being, it is important to recognize that the institutional frameworks and political choices that enabled this progress were the result of intense social struggles.

Another concern that is often overlooked stems from market size. Smith would likely have been shocked by the extent of specialization in the twenty-first-century economy (and probably also pleased with his foresight). Today, manufacturing relies heavily on complex global production networks. Final products such as automobiles and smartphones comprise thousands of components manufactured in multiple countries. Many of the intermediate links in those supply chains are extraordinarily specialized. The Dutch company ASML, for example, is the only producer of the ultraviolet lithography machines needed to produce advanced chips, most of which are manufactured by the Taiwan Semiconductor Manufacturing Company (TSMC).

But the widespread nature of this phenomenon suggests that the global market for many products can sustain only a few companies capable of achieving economies of scale. This has long been the case for large manufacturers in sectors such as aerospace, but it increasingly applies to smaller markets for intermediate components.

Consequently, Smith's other condition for economic growth - the presence of competition - is not met. Competition helps to ensure that economic growth is socially beneficial, because it prevents firm owners from monopolizing the benefits of specialization and increased exchange. As Smith put it in *The Wealth of Nations*, "In general, if any branch of trade, or any division of labor, be advantageous to the public, the freer and more general the competition, it will always be the more so."

Although the decline of competition has been a growing concern in Western economies over the past few years, the debate has largely focused on high-profile sectors within domestic markets, such as Big Tech. Policymakers on both sides of the Atlantic have responded to concentration in the tech industry with new laws, such as the European Union's Digital Markets Act, and tougher enforcement of existing antitrust laws, such as the US Federal Trade Commission's recent decision to block Microsoft's takeover of Activision.

The deeper policy question, however, is whether the level of specialization in certain markets has reached a tipping point where there is a trade-off between Smith's two prerequisites for growth. Has the division of labor reached its limit - and is the need to enhance competition therefore another reason to diversify supply chains and develop new sources of supply of production?

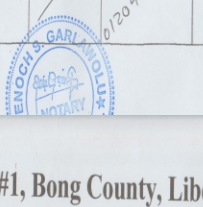

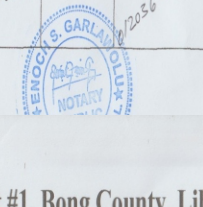

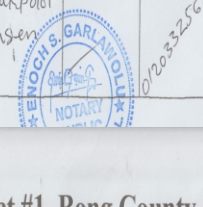

They were charged and sent to court Thursday, 22 June 2023 after several months of police investigation about the murder of Cllr. Scott's daughter Charloe Musu.

The defendants are accused of using a sharp instrument believed to be a knife to stab the late Charloe Musu.

Charloe's death in February this year shocked the country and heightened security fears.

She was murdered at Cllr. Scott's residence after the former Chief Justice reported to police authorities two separate incidents of alleged armed robbery attacks

## C and EI dialogue on privatization of education

The National Teachers Association of Liberia (NTAL) and a delegation from Education International (EI) have begun a two-day dialogue on the global response to the privatization and commercialization of education in Liberia.

"We want the Government of Liberia and all African governments to invest in education, invest in teachers and invest in education support personnel," EI Regional Director for Africa Dr. Dennis Sinyolo said Monday, 26 June 2023 in Monrovia.

At the start of a two-day dialogue on the global response to end the privatization and commercialization of education, Dr. Sinyolo stressed the need for the government in the region to strengthen public education. He noted that it will enhance the growth of the country, especially for Liberian children. "We at Education

International are embarking on a campaign called "Go Public! Fund Education and we want the Government of Liberia to strengthen public education and not to abandon it," he said. According to Dr. Sinyolo, Africa is lagging in terms of education due to a lack of sufficient budgetary allocation and a lack of sufficient qualified teachers. "Any country that refuses to invest more in education, that country will be

lagging behind and not be on par with its neighbors as it relates to national development," he said. Also speaking, Ms. Lucy Barimbui, EI Africa Regional Coordinator, said they are in Liberia to support the NTAL in its quest to better the education sector of the country. "We have come to empower, seek the mandate of the National Executive Council to continue as teachers in doing what they know best by delivering quality public education," she said.



## U.S. calls for collaboration to fight drug trafficking

The United States Government is encouraging the Liberia Drugs Enforcement Agency (LDEA) and Liberian security institutions to continue to work together to combat illicit drug trafficking and to strengthen their efforts to earn the confidence and trust of the Liberian public.

The Embassy of the United States near Monrovia made the call here on Monday, Jun 27, commemorated globally as International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking or World Drug Day. The U.S. Government lauds the LDEA and its Liberian security partners for working to reduce the trafficking of narcotics in Liberia, noting

this year's International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking commemoration, and will continue to work closely with the LDEA and other law enforcement agencies and the Ministry of Justice of Liberia in collaboratively reducing drug abuse and illicit trafficking, while helping those who suffer from addiction successfully pursue recovery. The statement from the U.S. Embassy Monrovia says the theme of World Drug Day 2023 is "People first: stop stigma and discrimination, strengthen prevention." It notes that the Liberia Drug Enforcement Agency's annual practice of holding a drug-burning exercise at Disco Hill, which also served as the cremation ground during the Ebola crisis, is a somber reminder that substance

"The LDEA continues to seize and destroy illicit drugs that enter Liberia through its borders and international ports, reducing the negative impact of these drugs on the lives of Liberians."

It underscores that the primary duty of every government is to protect its citizens from threats, which include drug abuse and illicit trafficking, but it is also the responsibility of ordinary citizens to support efforts to educate Liberian youth about the dangers of drug abuse.

"To bolster the Government of Liberia's efforts to improve drug demand reduction efforts as part of its narcotics response, the U.S. Embassy is training 105 trainers on the Universal Prevention and Universal Treatment Curriculum. We hope this evidence-based training improves Liberia's response to substance use amongst its population", the American government says. The Embassy hopes that U.S. government funding of projects with the Carter Center, the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, and the Colombo Plan will help LDEA move forward as a credible and effective organization.

It adds that the United States is pleased to provide support for

use disorders and drug trafficking do not disappear during crises and that communities in crisis—suffering from war, epidemics, or other disasters—struggle even more to recover when illicit drugs are present. The Embassy recalls that in his State of the Union address in 2023, President Biden announced increasing focus on disruption of illicit drug trafficking, expanding access to evidence-based prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery, and ensuring every jail and prison across the U.S. can provide treatment for substance use disorders. "U.S. Embassy Monrovia salutes the focus on increasing prevention, treatment, and recovery services for those with substance use disorders. By recognizing that law enforcement actions are only part of any response, these efforts offer a glimmer of hope to those suffering from addiction, and for their families and communities.

However, the U.S. reiterates that these developments must be evidence-based, properly resourced, and free of the stigmatizing "treatments" that often make recovery harder and deprive individuals of the community support they need to fight addiction.

# Zogoes protest demolition

campus allegedly upon order of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Liberia, Her Honor, Sie-A-Nyene Yuoh.

Speaking on behalf of his colleagues while protesting at the site on Monday, 26 June Student Israel Roberts explained that the school has been doing a lot for underprivileged youth from various communities especially, those who can't afford to fund their own education. According to him, the school has been offering free education to underprivileged or drugs-addicted youth (Zogoes) commonly referred to as at-risk youth and community residents, which has been a great opportunity for those of them who can't afford financially.

Student Roberts explains that they were learning tailoring and soap-making that have reincarnated them from zogoes to heroes, and that they are not willing to lose this opportunity.

He accuses the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Liberia, Her Honor, Sie-A-Nyene Yuoh of fighting people in the community for lands. He says as students, they are calling on the international community and the government to intervene and help rebuild the school. The Director of the United Methodist Human Rights

met them on the land.

He explains that they bought the land years ago from its rightful owner, contrary to claim by Chief Justice Yuoh that she purchased the same land for her daughter in January 2023.

He says it is in this light that the Chief Justice allegedly ordered demolition of the Center that is meant to rehabilitate at-risk youth and provide them skills. He says students and community residents joined Monday's protest because they are angry over the demolition of the facility. Knight discloses that the land in question was purchased between 2011 and 2012 and construction started since January this year when Chief Justice Yuoh allegedly demolished it, adding that during the demolition she met him on the site and claimed ownership of the land thus, ordering for the structure to be broken down.

The New Life Recovery and Rehabilitation Center in Marshall was demolished on June 22, 2023.

According to him, the facility is new life rehabilitation drugs service program that has catered to more than 5,000 young men across the country, who have been rehabilitated and

property since it was acquired to rehabilitate disadvantaged youth.

But according to Mr. Knight, Chief Justice Sie-A-Nyene Yuoh allegedly ordered 30 soldiers of the Armed Forces of Liberia and 20 officers of the Police Support Unit (PSU) to demolish the training center that costs US\$40,000.

He laments that the Chief Justice allegedly demolished the entire facility with other adjacent property covering about six acres of land. The human rights advocate explains the alleged action is discouraging and undermines the current fight against drug addiction in Liberia that is destroying future of young people.

He continues that there are so many young people in various communities the Center could have served, but without any official notice, whatsoever it was razed to the ground. The director of press at the Supreme Court of Liberia, Atty. Ambrose Manh says Chief Justice Yuoh is not disposed to respond to such an allegation, adding that Liberia is a country of law so, if Mr. Knight feels offended, he should go to court because Her Honor, Yuoh is not above the law.

# Boakai declares drugs nat'l emergency

Former Liberian Vice President Amb. Joseph Nyuma Boakai has declared the proliferation of drugs across the country a national security emergency threat that needs immediate arrest.

Mr. Boakai, who is making his second attempt for the presidency this October, has vowed to wage war against drug trafficking when he wins the nation's highest office.

"I view it as a threat to our national security, and must be elevated to a National Emergency. The statistics cannot be starker," the 78-year-old said during a press conference held on International Day Against Drugs Abuse Monday, 26 June 2023.

Boakai said the increasing exposure of Liberians, particularly the youth to drug abuse and addiction through ready access to banned substances, if not immediately arrested, will have enormous health, social, economic, and security implications on the country.

"It is estimated that 2 in 10 youth in Liberia are users of

the trial saga that ensued.

He also recalled the mysterious and unexplained departure from the country of all those who stood trial and "acquitted." of the drug-related charges. Boakai suggested that these are indications of the extent to which the country has been rapidly exposed in the last few years to the narco trade.

He said they also point to the vulnerability of the Liberian society to the impact of such large-scale assault by international criminal enterprises. "Significantly, it reveals the failure of national leadership, a weak and criminal justice system and crucially raises suspicion about the probable complicity of some higher-ups in this affair," he noted.

Boakai said it is now obvious that the Weah Administration is incapable, unwilling, complicit, and indifferent to this crisis.

"They don't see it as most Liberians see it - A NATIONAL EMERGENCY. This is why a change in national leadership is and should be now," he told Liberians.

The opposition leader cautioned Liberians to see their votes as an opportunity to reverse a dangerous trend by saving their children and securing their future. According to Boakai, abusers of drugs are prone to



narcotic substances. Some estimates have it that about 13% of the population is affected by drug addiction," said Amb. Boakai.

He noted that the correlation between substance abuse and crimes is equally worrying, with the police reporting an increase in drug-related crimes.

He warned that Liberia is fast gaining notoriety as a transshipment country for illicit narcotics, with the country shamefully appearing now as a "narco-state."

According to him, the country's weak law enforcement capacity, porous borders, and proximity to major drug transit routes help to contribute to trafficking to and through Liberia.

The Unity Party (UP) standard bearer recalled the recent seizure of 100 million United States Dollars worth of drugs, and

mental health illnesses and high suicidal tendencies, and may also die prematurely due to drug overdose.

He also noted that dependency on drugs often leads to crimes, which put both the users and society in peril because these young people are stigmatized and face harsh societal isolation.

Boakai promised to holistically declare war on drug trafficking and use when elected President of Liberia in the upcoming October 10 presidential and legislative polls. "I promise to declare war on drug trafficking and use when elected, which is why the decision you make on October 10 would be one of the most consequential in your lifetime," said Amb. Boakai.

He implored Liberians to remain vigilant and know that help is on the way to salvage their young people and society from "kush" and the throes of this epidemic.
