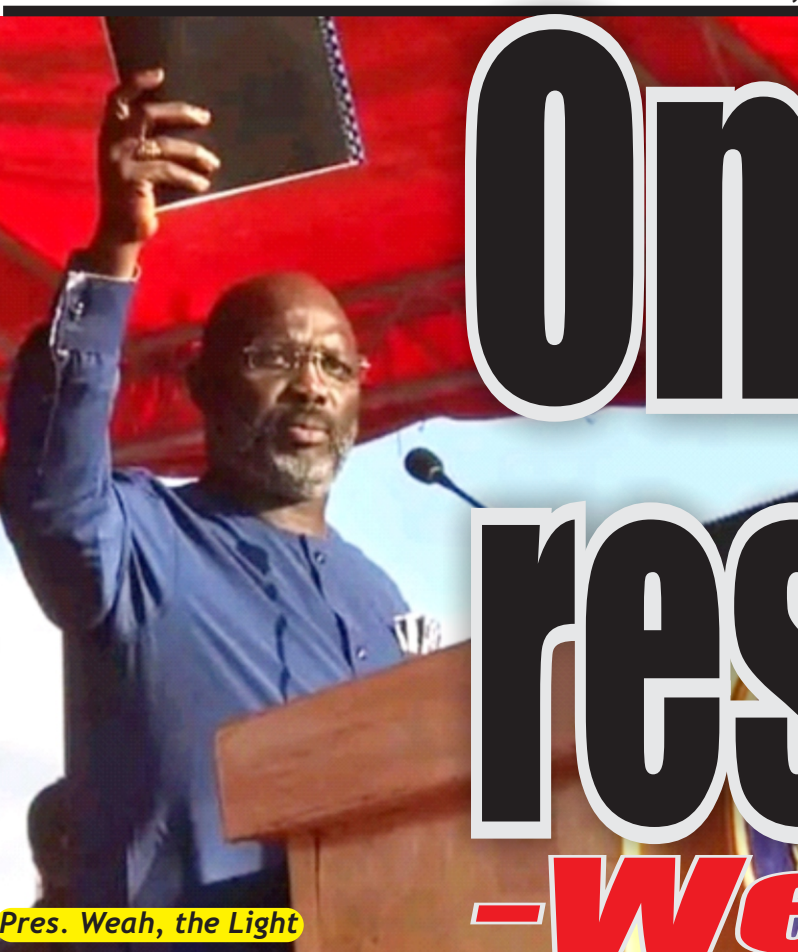

'Miracle babies' pastor acquitted by Kenya court

A controversial Kenyan televangelist, who claimed he created miraculous pregnancies, has been acquitted of child-trafficking charges due to insufficient evidence. The prosecution failed to prove

2017, after his decade-long legal battle to remain failed.

Concerns were first raised about the conduct of Mr Deya, who ran a church in London, in a BBC investigation in 2004.

Women experiencing difficulties conceiving who

Mr Deya later moved to Scotland, and was arrested in Edinburgh in 2006 under an international arrest warrant issued by Kenya. In his ruling on Monday, magistrate Robison Ondieki said the prosecution had "failed to establish circumstantial evidence".

Speaking outside court where his supporters cheered him on, Mr Deya said that he had forgiven those who wanted to see him in jail. "Today I'm acquitted of this kind of burden, a yoke on my shoulder... it has damaged my reputation," he told reporters, adding that it was "sad that I have been labelled as a child stealer".

"I'm grateful that I'm free. I'm now going to continue to proceed to the mission that Jesus gave to me on earth."

He hinted that he may seek to return to the UK.

In 2011, Mary Deya, Mr Deya's then wife, was jailed after being found guilty of stealing a baby from the main referral hospital in Kenya's capital Nairobi and falsely stating she had given birth to the baby. BBC

Tunisia and EU sign deal to tackle migration

Tunisia and the EU have signed a deal to tackle "irregular" migration - meaning those moving in breach of rules.

Tunisia has become the main departure point for migrants trying to cross the Mediterranean to Europe.

The EU has been struggling to cope, with 72,000 migrants making the journey this year alone, mostly to Italy.

The deal includes \$118m (£90m) to stop smuggling, strengthen borders and return migrants.

In recent months, black migrants in Tunisia have faced violent attacks due to an increasingly hostile environment.

Tunisia's President Kais Saied had accused migrants of partaking in a "plot" to change the country's demographic profile, blaming "traitors who are working for foreign countries". He later denied being racist.

Tunisia is suffering an economic crisis and increasing numbers of Tunisians are also trying to leave the country to go to Europe. The EU-Tunisia

deal says migrants at the border will be treated with the "full respect of human rights" and also seeks to carve out legal pathways for people to migrate.

The deal, which the EU describes as "strategic and comprehensive" also outlines a plan to boost Tunisia's economic growth through "socio-economic reforms" and greater cooperation on a green energy transition, education, research and innovation.

The European leaders, including Italian and Dutch Prime Ministers Giorgia Meloni and Mark Rutte, who were in Tunis for the signing of the deal described it as

an "important step" to deal with migration and an agreement which would also benefit "the Tunisian people", according to the AFP news agency.

President Saied also defended his record on migration, saying that the country "gave the migrants everything it can offer with unlimited generosity," AFP reports.

There is still a question mark over a long-term loan of \$1bn (£764m) that the EU has previously offered to help Tunisia out of its economic crisis, because it depends on the outcome of separate talks with the IMF.

Nigeria's 'tax collectors': Menacing and mafia-like

Hired as a so-called tax collector by several influential families, Captain Nwokuha has a fearsome look as he walks around with a piece of wood to enforce his authority at a busy and chaotic road junction in the southern Nigerian city of Port Harcourt.

The 34-year-old's job is to collect "taxes" for what he calls the "community" from taxis and 18-seater buses that operate in that part of the city. Mr Nwokuha's work has its roots in an old tradition, when businesses used to pay a one-off fee, or gift a drink, as homage to their hosts for good tidings. But now it has turned into what critics say is an extortion racket.

Some families, claiming to act on behalf of local communities, demand fees from businesses, be they taxi

crack down on what it calls "touts, miscreants and self-imposed tax collectors".

As for Mr Nwokuha, he believes he is playing a positive role, doubling up as a traffic officer who resolves disputes in the cut-throat taxi business. "If there is a fight among the drivers I settle it," says Mr Nwokuha, who patrols Port Harcourt's lucrative Rumuola interchange on weekdays from dawn to dusk in his fluorescent vest.

Before a driver sets off, the man with "task force" written on his vest receives 20% of the passengers' fares.

"The taxis are not allowed to operate here," says Mr Nwokuha, pointing at a "no parking" sign painted in police colours.

"But if they choose to, then they have to pay to the community," he tells the BBC.

On the rare occasion that a driver refuses to pay, they could

drivers or market traders, operating in what they see as their domain.

Mr Nwokuha says he collects 5-7,000 naira (£5-7; \$6.50-9) a day - a reasonable amount in Nigeria.

Married with two children, he keeps some of the money while the rest is given to five powerful families in the community - where it gets lost in a trail of private pockets.

So-called tax collectors or third-party agents are also used by Nigeria's states and local governments to collect some taxes.

"These agents use private accounts and make deductions before remitting to the government," says Michael Anjo, a former government tax official who is now with private firm Andersen Tax.

"[Their methods] create the impression that the state is using might and muscle rather than legitimacy."

Led by new President Bola Tinubu, Nigeria's federal government has vowed to

have a side mirror or taillight broken - or their registration plates removed. If they dare fight back, they might feel Mr Nwokuha's wooden stick cracking their skull. Mr Nwokuha is doing what ought to be the job of employees of the local council. Nigeria has 780 local councils but most of them are hardly functional. The vacuum is filled by men like Mr Nwokuha - or just about anyone who can set up a roadblock and enforce their authority. These tend to consist of a wooden bar between two rusty barrels, and home-made spikes for drivers who want to be smart by trying to avoid them.

They are most common in the richer southern parts of Nigeria, including highways where tax collection is done on behalf of some state governments. One lorry driver tells the BBC he pays as much as 80,000 naira (£80; \$100) as he travels through scores of roadblocks on his way from Nigeria's biggest city, Lagos, to Imo in the east: a distance of 540km (335 miles). More than we think of drug abuse in Liberia

Statistics from the Ministry of Health putting the number of At-risk youth or drug-addicted youth in Liberia at 47,917 is nothing but an understatement of a situation that has become a national crisis and center of discussion in all quarters of the country.

Parents, guardians and institutions across Liberia are lamenting a serious situation that threatens the next generation of Liberians and yet, authorities at the Ministry of Health wants the nation to believe that youth already affected by drugs are less than 50,000.

We vehemently disagree with this figure, for Monrovia alone, not to talk of Montserrado County, has more than 50,000 drug-addicted youth. They are in communities and ghettos across the city needless to talk about the entire county or the remaining 14 counties.

Substances such as cocaine, heroin, marijuana, tramadol, and kush, among others, are being smuggled into Liberia daily thru our porous borders, and even official port of entries as was experienced at the Freeport of Monrovia on two separate occasions with cocaine valued nearly 150 million United States Dollars!

Assistant Minister for Curative Services at the Ministry of Health and Head of the Technical Working Group for the government's At-Risk Youth Program, Dr. Gborbee G. Logan, revealed at the Ministry of Information's weekly press briefing last Thursday that a total of 47,917 at-risk youth are across Liberia.

Dr. Logan explained that after President George Weah launched a US\$13 million rehabilitation program in 2022 for drugs-addicted youth, a committee was established with a goal of reaching at least 500 youth per year, but revealed that recent weeks have shown an alarming increase in complaints from At-risk youth, particularly in Montserrado County.

His explanation clearly validates our position that the figure presented at MICAT press briefing last week is nothing but belittling the issue because drugs are being distributed across all 15 counties at a very fast pace than we imagine by well-organized syndicates that include both Liberians and aliens.

Even school campuses are not being spared by the network of unscrupulous individuals trading contrabands, particularly narcotics to our youth.

Come to think of this: The smugglers, distributors and dealers are ahead of whatever programs and steps that government intends to take to addressing the drug situation because they have collaborators among security forces of our country that man our borders. The security forces should be going after those corrupting the future our youth thru drugs, but the reality proves the contrary.

We must be sincere with ourselves as Liberians, particularly as government, and stop politicking with our youth. The Government of Liberia must muster enough courage to face the bleak future that lies before the next generation and work overtime in addressing the drug situation as a national emergency than paying lip service.

Africa's Most Consequential President?

WASHINGTON, DC - Shortly after taking office on May 29, Nigeria's President Bola Tinubu surprised many observers by implementing a series of bold reforms. In addition to scrapping costly fuel subsidies and various taxes, he suspended the country's central-bank governor, which led to the immediate removal of trading restrictions that propped up the value of the naira. And to curry favor with Nigeria's huge population of young people, Tinubu introduced interest-free loans to help students fund higher education.

But while these rapid reforms signal Tinubu's adherence to economic orthodoxy and may restore the confidence of Nigerians, international investors, and financial markets in the short term, by themselves they will not affect lasting change.

Nigeria's economy - Africa's largest - is in dire straits and transforming it will not be easy. Inflation recently hit an 18-year high, and large fiscal deficits are adding to already-soaring debt levels. The economy has been hit hard by the fallout from the war in Ukraine, partly because Nigeria depends on food imports, but also because the country - despite being Africa's biggest oil producer - is largely incapable of refining crude and thus imports petroleum. Mismanagement, security issues, and underinvestment in infrastructure have hobbled the oil industry, which generates around 80% of government revenues, while inconsistent official policies have prevented the agriculture sector, which employs about a third of Nigerians, from reaching its full potential.

That said, Tinubu's move away from interventionism is a step in the right direction, and he could further harness the demographic potential of Africa's most populous country by securing international investments and reducing bureaucratic red tape. But, most important, Tinubu will need to address broader security, energy, and governance challenges, which are often intertwined.

Security risks, which largely preoccupied Tinubu's predecessor, Muhammadu Buhari, threaten to derail the push for rapid reforms. But a growing economy could deter would-be militants from taking up arms by creating employment opportunities, especially if Tinubu can root out corruption, prevent monopolization, and reform the security sector.

Nigeria's oil-sector woes should also be a top priority. The fuel-subsidy reform will help restore fiscal discipline, given that Nigeria's state-owned oil company spent

\$10 billion on subsidizing petrol in 2022. Moreover, Aliko Dangote's \$20 billion oil refinery, where production is set to begin in July, could help reduce the country's dependence on petroleum imports, assuming that it does not become a private monopoly.

Tinubu has demonstrated little patience for firms cornering the market. While the monopolization of exports has typically been the focus of government regulation, import monopolies in oil-rich countries like Nigeria are also a significant obstacle to economic diversification and must be addressed. (It is worth noting that Tinubu suspended Nigeria's anti-corruption head for "abuse of office," although previous agency leaders have also been removed after facing similar allegations.)

To diversify the economy in the long term, the government will need to expand access to electricity, which only around 55% of Nigerians currently have. Fortunately, the potential for clean energy is enormous. Development partners like the World Bank can help with funding and guarantees to boost private investment in electricity distribution and renewables. But Tinubu's team will first need to improve the governance of the electricity sector, ensure a stable macroeconomic framework, and establish a conducive financial system.

Nigeria's vibrant tech ecosystem illustrates the potential that Tinubu could unlock. Hundreds of startups have emerged, particularly in the fintech sector, with Nigeria accounting for five of Africa's seven tech "unicorns" (private startups with a valuation of at least \$1 billion). The multiple-exchange-rate regime that prevailed prior to Tinubu taking office drained foreign reserves and gave importers an unfair advantage. Fewer exchange-rate restrictions will facilitate financial inflows, to the benefit of startups, which could in turn help transform the agriculture and transport sectors and empower millions of Nigerians.

If Tinubu stays the course on energy, security, and governance reforms, his agenda could ultimately benefit all of Africa - much like Saudi Arabia's economic experiment could transform the Middle East. But, unlike the Saudis, the Nigerian government does not have vast coffers to draw from and will need to rely more heavily on foreign and domestic private investment, coupled with the support of development partners. If given enough backing, Tinubu could remake the country - and even help remake the continent.

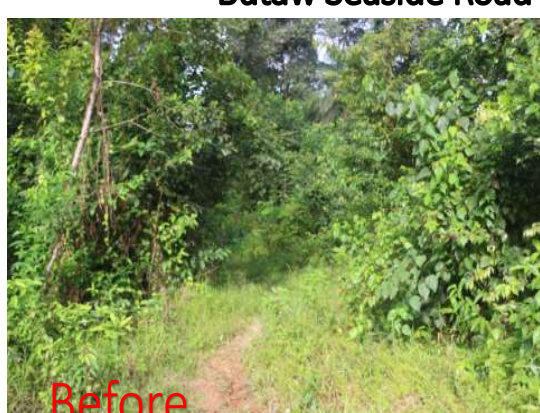

Bishop Kortu supports abortion against risks

As debate on abortion in the Liberian society intensifies, the former President of the Liberia Council of Churches (LCC) Bishop Kortu Brown, says he supports abortion for risks reason.

However, Bishop Brown, who is also Overseer of the Apostolic Pentecostal Church Liberia, cautions Liberians to carefully consider whether to legalize abortion on demand for any reason, up to 14 weeks.

Speaking Friday, 14 July at the end of a two-day retreat organized by LICOCES Teacher's College Training program held in the New Water in the Desert Apostolic Pentecostal Church edifice in Brewerville, Montserrado County, Bishop Brown argued that if a prospective mother faces life-threatening risks such as rape, incest and disability, abortion is should be allowed, noting "This is already legal in Liberia."

He cautions against any law that would legalize abortion for

more than three months for any reason other than threats to a mother's life. He underscores that a life from God is involved, and rejects abortion being committed for any reason for a young baby almost four months

shown that in some countries where abortion is legalized, one in four children are aborted, which is like losing a quarter of the country's population just through legal abortion alone.

He notes that it is difficult to articulate what a catastrophic impact that has had on those countries because there is no turning back once abortion is legalized, so once the floodgates are opened, thousands of children in Liberia will be legally killed. According to him, performing abortion just over three months would be something to carefully study because most abortions take place within the first 14 weeks, so such new law would make most abortions legal.

He continues that if the frequency came to European levels, about 15,000 children could be lost by abortion each year in Liberia because the proposed law allows abortion just for any reason, not merely for risks to the mother's life, arguing that "exceptional abortions are already legal in Liberia."

The Bishop wants Liberian lawmakers to engage a more moderate bill as they revise the Public Health Bill that would actually improve on the 1976 Law instead of adopting laws that could have unfavorable impact on the population of the country in years to come. Last week, the House's Committee Chairperson on Health, Representative Joseph Sowambee, disclosed that the 54th Legislature has been deliberating on whether or not to legalize abortion in Liberia.

USAID and Land Authority pen collaboration on Land Reform

The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and the Liberia Land Authority (LLA) on Friday, July 14, 2023, signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), setting forth a collaborative framework for the successful implementation of the Land Management Activity (LMA). The LMA is a USAID-funded project that is working with the LLA to help customary communities acquire (for the first time in their history) legal title to their lands. The LLA is Liberia's land regulatory agency charged with implementing the Land Reform Rights Act of 2018, including its provisions on land rights for customary communities. Customary communities are

typically rural communities that have occupied their lands subject to traditional rules and norms but without any recognizable tenure rights.

Under the Land Reform Rights Act, members of these communities that self-identify

as a group and complete certain steps, including resolution of all boundary disputes, are entitled to deeds legally recognizing their rights to land they have occupied for 50 or

FAO, NaFAA end 23rd Session on CECAF

The Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations in collaboration with Liberia's National Fisheries and Aquaculture Authority (NaFAA), over the weekend ended the 23rd Session of the Committee on Fishery For the Eastern Central Atlantic (CECAF) in Harbel, Margibi County.

Speaking at the 23rd Session, the Representative of the African Union, Christine Umotoni said she was grateful to be a part of the closing of the CECAF whose mandate is to promote the sustainable utilization of living marine resources through a science-based approach to fisheries management.

She explained that the one UN, of which FAO is an internationally respected part, sees the CECAF as a key technical group that could contribute significantly to the transformation of fishery management in the region.

Madam Umotoni added that the United Nations is grateful to FAO for globally leading in Agriculture,

sustainability in CECAF region,” she noted. However, Madam Umotoni urged that CECAF member states implement the recommendations to deal with the problems and save the sector. Meanwhile, she explained that the Liberia Government's priorities reflected in the FAO Country Programming Framework (2020-2024), entail the agricultural sector and sub-sector transformation.

C'est plus que ce que nous pensons de la situation de la toxicomanie

Les statistiques du ministère de la Santé selon lesquelles les jeunes à risque (jeunes toxicomanes) sont de 47 917 individus ne sont qu'un euphémisme d'une situation qui est devenue une crise nationale et est au centre des discussions dans tous les coins du pays.

Les parents, les tuteurs et les institutions à travers le Libéria déplorent une situation grave qui menace la prochaine génération de Libériens et pourtant, les autorités du ministère de la Santé veulent que la nation croie que les jeunes déjà touchés par la drogue sont moins de 50 000.

Nous ne sommes pas tout à fait d'accord avec ce chiffre, car Monrovia à elle seule, sans parler du comté de Montserrado, compte plus de 50 000 jeunes toxicomanes. Ils sont dans les communautés et dans les ghettos de la ville, inutile de parler de tout le comté ou des 14 comtés restants.

Ghana : le Parlement adopte une loi autorisant la production du cannabis médical et industriel

Le Parlement ghanéen a adopté mardi 11 juillet un projet de loi qui rend légal la production du cannabis à des fins médicales et commerciales. Cette loi va permettre la fabrication des médicaments et des produits comme le charbon, le béton, ou les textiles à partir de la plante de cannabis. Une décision qui pourrait permettre au Ghana, durement frappé par une crise économique, de s'octroyer une part de ce marché mondial qui pèse plusieurs milliards de dollars. 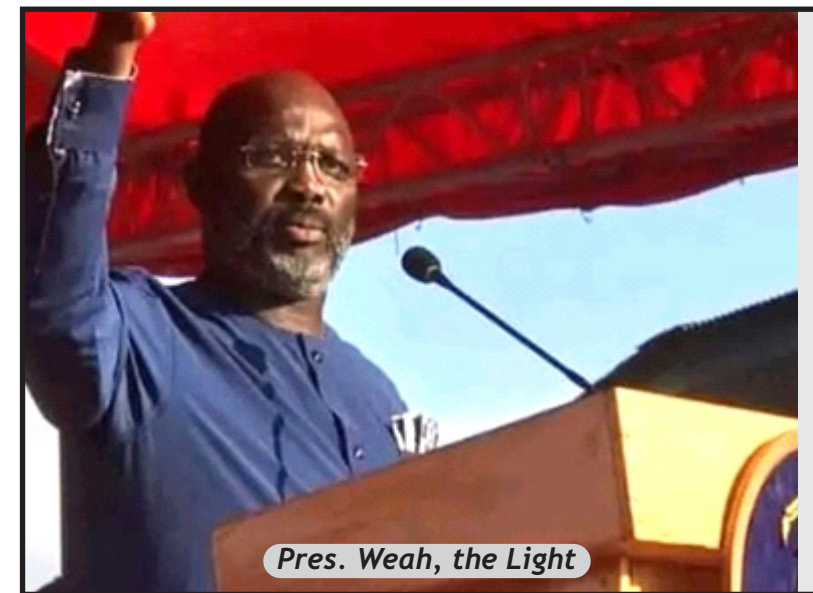

Gongloe calls for mass protest

Cllr. Tiawan Saye Gongloe, the standard bearer of the opposition Liberian People Party (LPP), has called for a mass protest against alleged corruption across the country.

"Ladies and Gentlemen, this press conference is to call upon the Liberian people to turn out on July 19, 2023 to take part in a major anti-corruption campaign under the theme: Anti-Corruption Campaign or (ACC)," said Cllr. Gongloe.

He told journalists at his law firm that the parade is meant to show to the world that Liberian people are against corruption because it has made life so unbearable in the country for the majority of the people.

Gongloe lamented that due to the high level of corruption in Liberia, many Liberian parents find it difficult to feed their families. He noted that

According to the terms of the MOU, the LLA will work with USAID and ECODIT (which is implementing the LMA on behalf of USAID) to ensure communities receive their customary land deeds within about 60 days of completing the process required under the Land Reform Rights Act to formalize title to their land.

To achieve this goal, the LLA will, among other things, support the LMA surveyor capacity development program, timely resolve all community boundary disputes, and conduct confirmatory surveys for communities that have successfully resolved all such disputes.

For its part, USAID, working through ECODIT, will collaborate with the LLA and provide technical assistance to

help customary communities satisfy the requirements for securing their land rights.

USAID will also partner with the LLA to ensure that customary communities manage communal land for productive use, and that women, youth, and other marginalized groups fully participate in and benefit from communal land management. Speaking during the signing of the MOU in Monrovia today, USAID Liberia Mission Director Jim Wright hailed the passage of the Land Rights Act as "one of the most progressive post-civil war reforms in Liberia."

He added that USAID was proud of the support it is providing through the LMA to ensure the successful implementation of the Act

and help address the "historic injustice that for so long has seen customary communities denied the right to own their own land."

LLA Chairman, Atty. J. Adams Manobah, Sr., thanked the United States for "supporting the implementation of the Land Rights Act," noting that "we at the LLA are committed to working with USAID and all other stakeholders to create a customary land tenure system that benefits all Liberians."

The USAID Land Management Activity is currently working to help 100 communities in four counties- Bong, Lofa, Nimba, and Grand Bassa - obtain customary land deeds.

The National Elections Commission (NEC) says 2,471,617 Liberians will participate in the 10 October 2023 presidential and legislative elections. NEC chairperson Madam Davidetta Brown-Lansanah announced the final figure Monday, 17 July 2023 after concluding the exhibition, deduplication, and adjudication processes of the 2023 Biometric Voter Registration (BVR) provisional registration roll. "This number represents One Million Two Hundred Thirty-seven Thousand Two Hundred Fifty-seven (1,237,257) Females and One Million Two Hundred Thirty-four Thousand Three Hundred Sixty (1,234,360) Males," she said. She explained at the NEC headquarters that from 12 to 17 June 2023, the Commission conducted the exhibition of the provisional registration roll from the 20 March to 11 May 2023 voter registration exercise. Before the exhibition, she said the NEC announced a preliminary figure of 2,498,904, of which 27,192 duplicate records were identified while 529 suspected underage registrants were flagged, and a total active registrant was 2,471,183. She explained that both active registrants and suspected underage



registrants were exhibited during the period. Following the conclusion of the exhibition exercise, she said in preparation for the announcement of the final figure, the Commission on 13 July 2023 demonstrated to the National Steering Committee on Elections (NSCE) the results of the
